mystery at the end of twenty-four

About 10 o'clock he went out for a walk with Mr. Dave Thomas of the street railway staff. They returned to the hotel about 11.30, and Thomas left Quirk at the floor.

The latter stepped into the hotel, and found Toole, his partner, and Eddie Kennedy, the bell-koy. Quirk told Toole that he had better go to bold Toole that he had better go to bed, and he (Quirk) would stay up and look after things. Toole went off to his room. Shortly afterwards Quirk told Kennedy that he also might retire. After that all knowledge of Quirk's movements are shrouded in mystery. Dr. Digby was summered, and he arrived shortly afterwards. He at once pronounced Quirk dead and suggested that the police and coroner be sent for. Sergeant Wallace appeared first on the scene, and was followed by Chief Vaughan and P. C. Donnelly. The three made a minute examination of the surroundings, and agreed that circumstances pointed strongly to murder.

When the murdered man the others When the murdered man was found he was lying on his back on the floor, with legs ex-tended toward the door, and with his head leaning to the right.

There were two deep pools of blood underneath him. Outside of the terrible wounds on the head and forehead, there were no marks on the body, and the spinal column was not broken. There was no trace found of either the perpetrator of the

found of either the perpetrator of the crime or the instrument used by him in doing his purpose. Judging by the nature of the wounds they were inflicted by some sharp, heavy weapon, resembling an axe.

Although the victim was discovered within ten minutes after he was seen last in the hotel office, nothing was seen of anyone else in the vicinity of the crime. Two boarders, who were awakened by the cries of the were awakened by the cries of the victim, looked out of their window, which overlooked the yard, but could which overlooked the yard, but could see nothing unusual. They went back again to bed, but, the cries continuing, they returned to the window and saw that the door leading into the harness room was wide open. The yard was almost as light as day at the time, owing to a full moon, and it seemed remarkable that, although about fifty boarders' rooms overlook the yard, and although overlook the yard, and although many of the boarders had not yet retired, that none of them could hear Quirk go out to the stable.

The coroner, Dr. Fissette, decided to hold an inquest. The jury examned the surroundings and remains at ined the surroundings and remains at 11.30 a.m. and adjourned, to meet in the court house at 8 p.m. When the inquest was resumed last night, there was a large crowd of spectators, all auxious to see the proceedings. Nothing of a startling nature was developed at the session. Evidence was given by David Thomas, Bob Ryan and R. Ellis. Their stories tallied with the account of liob Ryan and R. Ellis. Leaders Are Making Another

Effort For Peace.

Miles East, Under a Flag of Truce-Acting President Schalkburger and E. W. Reitz, ex-Secretary of the Trans vaal, Were of the Party-Acting Pres ident Narrowly Escapes Capture.

Pretoria, March 23 .- Acting Pre ident Schalkburger, F. W. Reitz, x-Secretary of State of the Trans-gaal, and Commandants Lucas Meyr and Krogh, with their secretaries and attendants, arrived here yesterday, March 22, at 2.04 on a special train from Balmoral, about 50 miles east of here. They came into Balmoral under a flag of truce.

Upon arriving here Mr. Schalkbur ger and his party drove immediately to Lord Kitchener's headquarters, where he had an interview with the British general. The Boers afterwards proceeded to the railway station and entrained at o'clock for Kronstad, whence will go out under a safe conduct

burger and his colleagues have been stationed at khenoster kop, north of stationed at Richoster Rop, north of Balmoral, where they have been closely pressed by British columns. Dispatch riders entered Balmoral Friday night and notified the Brit-ish of the approach of Mr. Schalkburger and his party.

Another Attempt at Peace. London, March 24 .- The news that the wandering Boer Government had entered the British lines is garded as having but one meaning namely, that another attempt is ing made to negotiate peace. The fact that the censor passed the news of this movement is accepted as confirmation of this opinion.

Nothing is actually known here of the intentions of Messrs. Schalkbur the intentions of Messrs. Schalkburger, Reitz, Meyer and Krogh. It is possible they have only sought permission to traverse the British lines in order to consult with Mr. Steyn and the Boer Generals Dewet and Delarey, but, whatever their object, the news has been welcomed in London as pointing to the possibility of peace.

Some correspondence which was seized some time ago when Mr. Steyn narrowly escaped capture proved that he and Mr. Schalkburger were anxious to conclude peace. SCHWAB INVADES ONTARIO

Obtains Controlling Interest in the Canadian Copper Co.

Organized a \$9,000,000 Company For the Purpose of Taking Over Nickel Properties in This Province - Mr. Schwab Acted as an Individual and Not as Representative of the United States Steel Corporation in the Deal.

New York, March 24. - The Tribune says: A report was current three or four months ago, and denied at the time by representatives of both companies, that negotiations were in progress for the purchase by the United States Steel Corpora-tion of a controlling interest in the Nickel Corporation of London, Eng-land. The basis for that report de-veloped yesterday, when it was learned that Charles M. Schwab, acting however, as an individual learned that Charles M. Schwab, acting, however, as an individual, and not in any sense as a representative of the United States Steel Corporation, had, in company with certain other capitalists, purchased an interest in the Nickel Corporation an interest in the Nickel Corporation and other nickel-producing concerns. Robert M. Thompson, president and principal owner of the Orford Copper Company, when asked about a published statement that control of that company, the Canadian Copper Company of Cleveland, and the Nickel Company of Paris, France, had been obtained by Mr. Schwab had been obtained by Mr. Schweb and several of his financial as-sociates, who had organized a \$9, 000,000 for taking over these pro-perties, said:

"Our company obtains a large part of its supply

r'Our company obtains a large part of its supply of nickel from the mines of the Canadian Copper Company, in the Province of Ontario, and the New Caledonian Mines of the Nickel Corporation of London (not the Nickel Company of Paris). The stock of these two companies seemed to me a desirable investment, and I and several associates, among them Mr. Schwab nursupplements of the section of the companies of the section of the companies of the section of the ciates, among them Mr. Schwab, purchased a controlling interest in the Canadian Copper Company, and a considerable block of stock of the considerable block of stock of the Nickel Corporation, although not enough to constitute control. It is our purpose to form a holding company, capitalized, probably at \$9,000,000, to which will be transferred the controlling interest in the Orford Copper Company and the Canadian Copper Company, and our holdings of Nickel Corporation stock. LACROIX PAYS FOR HIS CRIME. Double Murderer Hanged at Hull, Que bec, on Friday.

Hull Jail, Que., March 22.—Stanislas Lacroix was hanged in Hull jail yesterday morning at 8.05 o'clock. He died gamely. Rev. Father Forget made a brief statement on behalf of the murderer, who said he admitted his guilt, and died at peace with the world and his God. Lacroix did not go to bed Thurs-

Lacroix did not go to bed Thursday night, but sat up with the nuns and prayed, His little son was with him until nine o'clock, and was with his doomed father again early yesterday morning. The three brothers of the murderer and his three sisters bade him farewell about twenty min-

utes to eight.

When the hangman entered the cell
Lacroix said he bore him no hard
feeling, and asked him to do the

The scaffold was exposed and about fiteen spectators were present. Af-ter the black cap was adjusted La-croix was cautioned by the priest to keep up heart. He said, "I am not afraid to die." At 8.05 the signot afraid to die." At 8.05 the sig-nal was given and Lacroix fell nine feet. Thirteen and a half minutes later the jail surgeon pronounced the man dead. His neck had not been

had ucad. His neck had not been broken by the fall, but death was due to strangulation.

Lacroix was hanged for the brutal murder of his wife on Aug. 24, 1900.

A year previous they had separated. The day before the crime Lacroix A year previous they had separated. The day before the crime Lacroix bought a revolver and then followed his wife into the house and caught her crouching behind the door, and holding the baby. Catching her by the hair of the head he dragged her out. The woman, clinging to her baby, tried to reach the door, and Lacroix shot her in the hand. Falling upon her knees the woman screamed, "Stanislas, what do you mean?" For an answer Lacroix shot For an answer Lacroix shot her again and she fell dead. Lacroix returned to the house where his wife had been and shot dead an old man named Hippolyte Thomas de Franchemontagne
