## TO THE ELECTORS OF EAST MIDDLESEX.

Gentlemen.—In compliance with the solicitations and requests of a large number of the electors of the Electoral District of East Middlesex, I have again consented to become the Independent candidate for the representation of this riding in the Parliament of Canada, believing as I do, that at no time in the history of our Dominion has there been a greater necessity for independent thought and action than at present. I would, if elected, support a liberal trade policy between Canada and Great Britain, thereby tending to strengthen the bonds of union that exist between the Dominion and the mother land. A tariff for revenue purposes only, is all that should be maintained. I would favor the obtaining by every legitimate effort, of a favorable reciprocity treaty between Canada and the United States. The freest trade relations possible should be consistent with the position we hold as a part of the British Empire. I am opposed to all combinations that advance the value of the necessities of life to consumers. The freest possible exchange of products should be brought about between the farmer and the manufacturer. The farmer has a right to obtain the full value of his earnings, and the produce of the country should be carried to the seaboard for a just consideration. The system of granting railway charters requires amending, and the public lands should be reserved for actual settlers. Not another acre should be given to railways. While the church is entitled to entire freedom in its own domain, I will oppose the granting to any creed or nationality of privileges not equally enjoyed by all. I believe in complete separation of Church and State, and will defend to the utmost the rights and privileges that have been handed down to us by our forefathers. A simpler and less expensive method than the present system of preparing the voters' lists is desirable, and the matter of one man one vote and the purity of elections I will heartily support. If elected I will support all good measures that may come before the House, independent of party consideration. As a retired farmer who has successfully carried on farming operations for a considerable portion of my life, I can well understand and appreciate the requirements of a farming community, and should the electors of this riding confide their trust in me by securing my return as their representative the interests of the electors of this constituency shall be my first and last thought. The will of the people should be supreme in all matters of legislation and government and, I am therefore in favor of submitting to a vote of the electors of the Dominion, whenever petitioned for the question of prohibition of liquor traffic or other matters of vital importance to the country.
