The Deadlock Between the Two

Branches of Congress

Broken.

The House is Forced to Accept

the Senate Tariff Bill,

But Will Continue Its Efforts for

Free Coal, Sugar and Iron.

Mr. Wilson's Startling Exposure of

the Sugar Trust.

Messrs. Wilson and Crisp Address Their

Colleagues—The Motion to Adopt

the Senate Bill Carried.

WASHINGTON, Aug. 13.—Mr. Wilson has stated substantially that there was no prospect for tariff legislation unless the Senate bill was adopted.

A meeting was held in Speaker Crisp's room this morning to decide what action the House leaders should take with reference to the tariff bill in the caucus. There were present in the committee room, besides the speaker, Mr. Wilson, Mr. McMillan, Mr. Montgomery, Mr. Turner and Mr. Breckenridge, of Arkansas, also members of the committee. Shortly before 10 o'clock the statement was made on the authority of one of these gentlemen that it had been decided to

ACCEPT THE SENATE BILL.

At 10 o'clock not more than two score members were absent from their places. Everyone felt that the time had arrived when some decisive action should be taken regarding the disputes between the two Houses, and the hope was generally expressed that no opposition would be made to the Senate bill in order that a speedy termination of the long contest should be reached.

Mr. Helman, chairman of the caucus, took the chair. When the roll call, which showed 173 members were present, was completed, a hush of expectation fell upon the caucus.

Mr. Wilson author of the Wilson Bill, took the floor. Although outwardly calm and cool he was manifestly laboring under deep emotion. His speech for the first five minutes was general in character and contained no specific points. It was devoted in the beginning to an explanation of the embarrassments under which the House conferees had labored. He said the representatives of the House had gone into the conference with a desire of faithfully representing the wishes of their colleagues. That they had failed to reach a satisfactory conclusion alike honorable to the House and to the Democratic party was not their fault.

Mr. Wilson made a special reference to the sugar schedule. He stated the different propositions relating to sugar, which had been advanced in the conference, and proceeded to show the specific points which would be conceded to the trust from the acceptance of these various propositions. Mr. Wilson said from the beginning of the conference they had been given to understand from day to day that any division of the Senate votes in sugar, coal and iron were would

or at least the postponement of the bill. Mr. Wilson stated subsequently that there was no prospect for tariff legislation unless the Senate bill was adopted.

MR. WILSON'S EXPOSURE.

Mr. Wilson went on to show that the House people had contended stoutly for a specific rather than an ad valorem duty on sugar. A specific duty would show precisely what benefit the trust would get, while it would be impossible to determine this accurately under the ad valorem system. He said the sugar trust, becoming convinced that the Senate schedule would be adopted, had made heavy purchases of foreign raw sugar. He then made the startling statement on the authority of a leading Democratic Senator that the trust had bought sugar to the amount of \$112,000,000 in the foreign market in anticipation of the Senate sugar schedule receiving the approval of the President. Under the Senate schedule the
