Good Mutton.

A fat young ewe affords the best ripe mutton; next a good wether. The sheep selected for mutton should be kept quiet and cool in a dark place, twenty-four hours without anything to eat, but with all the water it will drink; above all things it should not be worried and heated. The neck being laid across a block, may be severed at a blow with an axe, and the flow of blood should be made as complete as possible by the butcher seizing the hind leg and gently pulling and pushing with a foot on the carcass. The disemboweling and skinning should be quickly dispatched. Let the sleep be hung up, ripped and the bowels removed; then the skinning can be performed afterward. Immediately after the sheep is hung up, if a hole is made between the hind legs and the abdomen filled up with very cold water it will assist in preventing the "sheepy" taste. - Ohio

Farmer. The Difference Between Knots and Miles.

One of the things which it seems difficult for the public mind to grasp is that there is a decided difference between the knot and the mile. It is certainly about time to have it thoroughly understood that the two are not the same thing. It seems easy enough to remember that a mile is only about 87 per cent. of a knot, the latter being approximately 6,082 feet in length, while the statute mile measures 5,280 feet. - Carrier's Magazine.

Cut Flowers. You should always pull the leaves off the stalks of flowers before putting them in water-those which would be in the water, not those above it. And with flowers from any hard-stalked sort of shrub the bark should be pealed off as well as the leaves. The flowers live ever so much longer if these precautions are taken. A scrap of charcoal in the water is also a

great preservative, The Economy of Bees in Nature. Dr. J. M. Hicks discourses on the aid of bees in the fertilization of flowers in the

following well-chosen language: "How beautiful we see and realize the fact that bees are the sure messengers in assisting horticulture and the horticulturist in reaping and gathering a bountiful harvest of fruits as well as many of the various grains and seeds of the land. Thus, when combined with the service performed by the bees in their eager pursuits, our admiration extends beyond them to their Great Originator, who, by such apparently small means, accomplished so simply yet so completely a most important object of creation. While the bees are receiving from the plants sustenance and at the same time giving them fertility, both to the horticulturist and to the florist is seen their valuable assistance in procuring remunerative returns. Thus it is true that if it were not for the valuable aid that bees and other insects perform in fertilizing many of the blooms of fruit trees and garden plants, we should soon be found wanting in a proper supply of fruit and seeds in carrying on the laudable business of horticulture, as well as fail in having seeds of a good quality at planting time. Thus we see that the two are directly and in timately connected with and depend largely upon each other."

Rice Cultivation in Madagascar. The cultivation of rice in Madagascar is highly developed in the interior of the island, but much less along the coast, where the lazy, careless natives find the land more fertile and the temperature more favorable. In some places, as in the neighborhood of Tananarive, immense marshes, subject to annual inundations and the source of malignant fevers, have been transformed into rice fields.
