TORONTO, Jan. 26—11 p.m.—There is a
slight depression hovering to-night over
the lake district and a storm is developing
off the Carolina coast. Fair, cold weather,
with pressure above the normal, covers the
lake and eastern district. In the North-
west the pressure is high and the weather
fine and cold.

below—12°; Edmonton, 12° below—14°;
Qu'Appelle, 32° below—10°; Prince Albert,

Toronto, 16°—22°; Kingston, 8°—20°; Mon-
treal, 6° below—6°; Quebec, 12° below—14°;
Halifax, 6°—14°.

A Scottish Night.

For three hours last night the members
of St. Andrew's Society and Clan Fraser
and a large crowd of their friends enjoyed
a thorough treat in the Grand Opera
House. The occasion was the celebration
of the birthday of the national poet, Robert
Burns, and a splendid programme was put
on. Miss Boon read "Saunders Mc-
Glashan's Courtship," causing much merriment
and securing an encore, to which she
responded with "A Bit Wise." Geo.
Angus, jun., proved himself to be a most
talented violinist. His "Rhapsody of Scotch
Airs" was loudly applauded, and he was
compelled to play another delightful piece as
an encore. Miss Gilmour is always a
favorite with a London audience, and she
did herself much credit in singing "O' a'
the Airts, the Wind Can Blye" and "Lang,
Lang Syne," both of which were encores.
She gave with telling effect "Flow Gently,
Sweet Afton." Miss Mutch sang "Tam
Glen" and "Callie Herring." Her reception
was most generous, and she was rapturously
encored. Mrs. A. E. Cooper's sing-
ing was, as usual, from the heart, and
was most artistic. She gave, with
fine effect, "Castles in the Air," and
in response to an enthusiastic
recall, "Bonnie Banks o' Loch Lomond."
Subsequently, with Mr. J. W. McIntosh,
she charmed the audience with that old
favorite duet, "The Crookit Babe," which
was vociferously applauded. The
audience thoroughly enjoyed the Highland
dancing, which is always a feature of the
Scottish anniversary. The concert was
opened with a lively Scotch reel, in which
Miss Katie Ash, Messrs. Wm. Templeton,
John Rattray and Frank Wilson partici-
pated. Subsequently Miss Katie Ash
danced an Irish jig in character; Messrs.
Rattray and Templeton gave a double
sword dance, and Mr. Wilson a
sailor's hornpipe, all of which were
encored with much vigor. Miss Ash
was the recipient of a magnificent bouquet.
Misses Lilian and Beatrice Shand, fresh
from their triumphs of a western trip, had
a warm reception when they appeared in a
Highland fling, and they were so enthu-
siastically cheered that they had to return
and dance the "Sham Treva." Later
they sang the pretty little duet, with dance
accompaniment, "Down Where the Honey-
suckle Grows," and as an encore a charm-
ing little song and dance was given. They
are clever and accomplished. The hit of
the evening, however, was made by Goldie,
of Philadelphia, the much-heralded Scot-
tish comedian. He kept the house in roars
of laughter, and though he was down to his
but three songs, the audience so enjoyed
his funny stories and his grimaces that
they moved him, by thunders of applause,
to appear nine times. Goldie will always
find a welcome in London. Mr. J. W.
McIntosh, who made an excellent master
of ceremonies, sang "Mary o' Argyle" with
his old-time vigor and was down to his
knees to be said that Miss Phillips
and Mr. Charles Wheeler proved model
accompanists, and that Mr. George Angus
played the pipes to perfection. Mr. Donald
McGregor, the latest accession to the
piping strength of the St. Andrew's
Society, made his initial bow to a London
audience and was well received. He
knows how to play, and will be a distinct
accession to the society. Regret was ex-
pressed that Piper Alex. Milne was unable
to appear. The very successful anniversary
was brought to a close with the singing of
"Auld Lang Syne," led by the performers
of the evening and joined in by the audi-
ence, and the "National Anthem."
