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CRAZED BY HEAT!

Fourteen Harvesters in One Field Become Insane—Kansas Corn Crop Ruined.

Wichita, Kas., July 5.—Fourteen harvest hands working in the large wheat fields belonging to L. R. Jacobs, were prostrated by the heat, and yesterday were adjudged insane in the probate court at Wellington. Judge Harvey expressed his opinion that the men were driven insane by the extreme heat. The temperature stood at 106 when the men were prostrated. In Southern Kansas hundreds of harvest hands have been forced to quit work. No rain has fallen for 14 days. Average temperature in the open was 101.

The corn crop is ruined and no amount of rain at this time can save it. There was no 4th of July celebration here owing to the extreme heat.

Paterson, N.J., July 5.—John Vonah, a resident of New Brunswick, N.J., was driven insane by the heat while in George C. Lammert's place in Market street, this city. He was removed to St. Joseph's Hospital. The police-men were leaving the institution when the madman ran out and tried to escape. He hit a piece out of Police-Constable's arm, and sank his teeth into Officer Kelly's hand. He died half an hour later.

DECLINE IN THE IRON TRADE

The British Output for Last Six Months Smallest on Record.

Sixty Men Buried by a Landslide in a Railway Tunnel in Hungary—Earl Russell's Trial for Bigamy Postponed—Wet and Cold in Paris.

IRON TRADE'S DECLINE IN ENGLAND.

London, July 5.—Statistics are printed from which it appears that the output of manufactured iron in the north of England since Jan. 1 was smaller than any period during the previous six months, reaching a total of only 45,466 tons. The output during the corresponding period in 1900 was 76,730 tons, and in 1899, 85,381 tons. Prices also show a considerable decrease, the average for all classes of manufactured iron at the end of December having been £8 6s 2d, while it is now £7 18 7d.

TORRENTIAL RAINSTORM.

St. Petersburg, July 5.—There was a torrential rainstorm at Simferopol, a town in the Crimea, 37 miles northeast of Sebastopol. The Salgir River, on which the town is situated, was flooded, and all of the bridges there were washed away. Two children were drowned.

Paris, July 5.—The unseasonable weather continues. Today was stormy and cold.

SYMPATHY FOR HEAT SUFFERERS.

London, July 5.—The newspapers here devote much space to the American heat wave. The seriousness of the scourge is sympathetically appreciated.

TO BAR OUT AMERICAN SHOES.

Vienna, July 5.—The common councils of Lower Austria are considering a proposal to forbid sales of American boots and shoes on the ground that such sales are ruining the home industry.

SIXTY MEN ENTOMBED.

London, July 5.—A landslide, due to floods, buried a working party of 60 men in a railway tunnel at Marton, near Glasgow. A dispatch to the Daily Mail from Vienna. Troops were summoned, and they have recovered the bodies of three of the victims, and rescued five of the injured survivors.

GERMAN FINANCIAL CRISIS.

The correspondent in London of the New York Tribune says that great uneasiness prevails in London concerning the financial crisis in Germany.

THE RUSSO-AMERICAN TARIFF WAR.

Attention is directed to the increasing disinclination of the Russian authorities to permit the importation of goods which the Russians can produce, no matter what they cost. This policy more than the tariff, obstructs foreign trade. Lawyers, representing the largest financial interests in America, who were recently here, offered \$40,000,000 to build the Viatka Railway, provided a certain proportion of American material was used. The reply from the finance minister was that not one pound of such material could be used.

THE KING'S TITLE.

In the House of Commons yesterday Mr. Chamberlain, colonial secretary, announced that a bill would shortly be introduced, changing the title of the King so as to more clearly recognize his sovereignty over the entire British empire.

EARL RUSSELL'S TRIAL.

The petition of Earl Russell for a postponement of his trial was presented at a special session of the House of Lords. The petition was granted and the hearing was adjourned until August 6. Counsel for Earl Russell, in supporting the application, suggested that his lordship's proceedings in Nevada had been approved by high legal authority in the United States. Evidence in regard to the desert and domicile in Nevada could only be given in America by the witnesses, and must be prepared with great fullness and care.

The attorney-general opposed the postponement. He said Judge Currier, of Nevada, was an essential witness and he must be back home at the end of August. There was, he said, some delay would be permitted.

VICKERS AND MAXIM.

A meeting of the Vickers Sons & Maxim (Limited) shareholders at Sheffield agreed to the proposal of a new issue of £1,000,000 in ordinary shares.

PIERCE FIGHTING.

Manila, July 5.—An engagement lasting two days has occurred at a point 30 miles east of Zamboanga, Island of Mindanao, between Datto Tim and his followers and the followers of Datto Sowbayan. The losses of both sides were heavy, and the result of the engagement indecisive. The Sultan of Mindanao, who is friendly towards the Americans, professed ignorance as to the cause of the outbreak.

CABLE NOTES.

George Howard, who was arrested at J. Pierpont Morgan's house in London recently, where he pretended to be repairing electric wires, was sentenced to four years' penal servitude. He stole jewelry from various houses to the value of £10,000.

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GIRL STOLEN FROM PARIS

Abducted From Convent by Her Sister and Two Men.

A Second Russian Bank Collapses—Suicide of Another Director.

FAILURE OF ANOTHER RUSSIAN BANK.

St. Petersburg, July 5.—In consequence of the failure of the Kharkoff Commercial Bank, the Commercial Bank of Ekaterinoslav suspended payment yesterday. Its liabilities are 1,250,000 roubles.

DIRECTOR SHOT HIMSELF.

Leipzig, July 5.—Another director of the Leipzig Bank, Karl Felix Schaeffer, committed suicide by shooting himself this morning. Schaeffer was also a member of the firm of Berger & Voigt. This firm declares it is not affected by Schaeffer's death, as he sold his share of the business yesterday on favorable terms.

ABDUCTION IN PARIS.

Paris, July 5.—Lucie Leobald, an orphan, who has been for the last five months in a Franciscan convent, was abducted on the street here today. Lucie, accompanied by other girls from the convent, was on her way to mass, when Adele Leobald, her sister, whom the nuns forbade to enter the convent, owing to the fact, as they said, that she cultivated bad companions, descended from a cab and approached Lucie.

As she did so she said: "I am going on a voyage and wish to say good-bye." While talking she gradually drew Lucie nearer to the cab, out of which jumped two men, who seized the girl and galloped off.

The cab was followed by the screaming pupils and the nuns, who were unable to secure another cab. A large number of police are actively engaged in searching for the girl.

LONDON MAN TO GO OVER THE FALLS

Carlisle D. Graham Will Make Attempt in a Barrel.

Performed the Daring Feat in 1889 in a Barrel Made in This City.

Carlisle D. Graham, formerly of this city, who went over Niagara Falls in a barrel on Sept. 1, 1889, now declares that he will make the attempt to repeat the performance, if he can elude the police, who are watching him closely.

The barrel in which Graham first went over the falls, was made at John Forrester's cooper shop on Bathurst street, near Adelaide, by himself.

Graham, who is now at Niagara, says he has gained much experience in barrel navigation since his first trip over the falls, and that there is little danger attached to his proposed feat. He has had a cask constructed after plans which he believes will insure his absolute safety. The cask is scarcely larger than an ordinary barrel. It is much like the cask in which Graham made his first trip over Niagara Falls.

It is 4 feet long, 2 feet in diameter, at the top, 15 inches at the bottom, and at the bulge near the top 27 inches. The barrel weighs 150 pounds.

Just when Graham will make his attempt has not been learned, as he is keeping his plans secret to avoid possibility of arrest. It is not known if he will go over the falls in 1889 he divested himself of all clothing except a pair of trunks, two undershirts and a pair of socks.

He crouched down in the bottom and fastened himself in with canvas strips. Then the barrel was rolled up the river above the falls, where it was cast adrift. It was 50 minutes before the barrel was recovered at the eddy below the falls.

TRAIN ROBBERS MAY BE CAPTURED

The Fugitives Surrounded Near the Scene of Their Crime.

St. Paul, July 5.—A special from Great Falls, Mont., says: "The three men who held up the Great Northern transcontinental westbound express, near Wagner, 196 miles east, Wednesday afternoon, will probably be captured soon. Sheriff Griffith, with a posse of twenty men, has surrounded them at Buck Allen's ranch, 40 miles south of Wagner, near the edge of the old Fort Belknap reservation, on the west fork of the Poudre River.

It is probable that the first estimate of the loss, \$33,000, is somewhat excessive. Reliable information since received is that \$70,000 was secured, and that this with the damage to through express equipments, resulting from the explosions in the cars, will represent the entire loss to the company.
