THREE FIRES.

LONDON CLERGYMEN WELCOMED ROYALTY.

The close of the first provincial synod of the ecclesiastical Province of Canada in the new century will be an occasion of historical interest, for it was honored by a visit of the heir apparent of the throne and by the Duchess of Cornwall and York. Owing to the sudden illness of His Grace the Archbishop of Montreal, Bishop Sweatman, of Toronto, formerly of London, presided, and met their royal highnesses at the gate of the theological college, and, with the secretary, Rev. Dr. Baylis, and the reception committee, accompanied them to the hall, where the members of the provincial synod and a large gathering of laymen and clergymen were waiting. Among those on the platform was the Bishop of Huron, and among the other Ontario delegates were Chancellor V. Cronyn, of London, and Very Rev. Dean Innes, also of London, prolocutor of the lower house. The latter addressed their royal highnesses as follows: "On behalf of the lower house."

Major Maude, C.M.G., telegraphed an answer yesterday to City Clerk Kingston's outline of the proposed entertainment and request for more definite information. His message was as follows:

Ottawa, Ont., Sept. 22. "C. A. Kingston, City Clerk, London. "Your telegram of yesterday's date. Their royal highnesses will leave Toronto by Grand Trunk and travel via Guelph to Berlin, reaching London at 12:15, and leaving at 1:30 p.m. on 12th October. His royal highness will receive addresses and present colors to Seventh Regiment as requested. (Signed) MAJOR MAUDE."

Tuesday, Sept. 24, at 4:15 the students of the Collegiate Institute and Model School are invited to attend. Mrs. Weld will have charge of this service. At 8 p.m. the J. W. T. "TRUE GREATNESS"

Mrs. Baker Eddy's Tribute to the Late President McKinley.

Concord, N. H., Sept. 22.—In connection with the memorial meeting for President McKinley held here, Mrs. Mary Baker Eddy has made public the following: "Impetuous, accumulative, bold, desirous of the life and labors of our late loved president, William McKinley. Praying for the destinies of our nation, more to him than a mere rehearsal of aphorisms, a uniting of breaches soon with a quiet ascent or descent. It began with heavy strokes, measured movements reaching from the infinitesimal to the infinite, it began warming the marble of politics into zeal according to wisdom, quenching its volcanoes, uniting a tenderness not talked, but felt and lived. His humanity, weighed in the scales of divinity, is not found wanting. His public intent was uniform, consistent, sympathetic—and so far as it fathomed the abyss of difficulties was wise, brave, unselfish."

"May his history waken a tone of truth that shall regenerate, renew, ennobly, emphasize humane power and best its banner into the vast forever. While our London's waters of peace and prosperity waves over land and sea, while her reapers are strong, her sheaves garnered, her treasury filled, she the silently stricken, called to mourn the loss of her renowned leader. Tears blend with her triumphs. She stoops to think, to mourn, to pray that the God of harvest send her more laborers, who, while they work for their own country, shall secretly regard the liberty of other peoples and the rights of man."

"What cannot love and righteousness achieve for the race? All that can be accomplished and more than history has yet recorded. All good that ever was written, taught or wrought, comes from God and human faith in the right. Through divine love the right government is assimilated, the way pointed out, the process consummated. Let God sanctify our nation's sorrow in this world, and his rod and his staff comfort the living as it departs, and may his love shield, support and comfort the mourner at the desolate home."
