**WHY GROCERS DISSOLVED**

Rumor That Unfair Division of Profits Was Cause Is Denied.

A dispatch from Hamilton says: No further steps have been taken to make the announced dissolution of the Canada Grocers, Limited, a fact, and a week or so may elapse before any other step is taken. Rumor has been busy finding reasons for the dissolution. One rumor, which was denied by George E. Bristol, president, today, was that the dissatisfaction arose from an unfair division of the profits. Each of the eleven individual houses in the company pays to the parent company the profits of the business, and dividends are paid on a pro rata basis. Some of the houses rated the same in standing, earn much more than others, and they think that an equal division is unfair. Mr. Bristol denied that this was true. Another official of the company said that he thought there might be some washing of dirty linen before the affair was through.

Crown Attorney Washington says that this will not affect the prosecution of the Dominion Guild. The guild is composed of all the wholesale grocery houses in Canada, and the Canada Grocers of eleven houses, in Hamilton, Toronto, London and Windsor. The two are not connected, but some people have the idea that the recent prosecution was against the Canada Grocers, instead of the Dominion Guild.

**TALKED SPECIALLY TO THE MEDICOS**

Rev. E. B. Lanceley Addresses Students at Dundas Street Methodist Church.

Over one hundred students of the London Medical College attended the Dundas Street Methodist Church in a body last evening, the pastor of the church, Rev. E. B. Lanceley, having consented to preach especially to them. Many members of the college faculty were also in attendance.

Mr. Lanceley, at the close of the sermon, made an announcement of special interest to the members of the graduating class. He stated that in addition to the medals, prizes and diplomas to be presented at the commencement exercises, there will be given a medal to the graduate who has exerted the strongest moral influence upon his fellow-students of the class during the college year. The question of who is entitled to the medal will be decided by the members of the class. The medal is to be donated by a member of the Dundas Street Methodist congregation, and Mr. Lanceley declared that no higher honor could be conferred than to be declared entitled to it.

The sermon was based on Luke vi. 19, and in the course of his remarks Mr. Lanceley spoke of the great work of the physician. He also referred to the lofty nature of the medical profession, and in speaking of the miracles performed in olden times, he said that every week there are wondrous miracles of healing wrought in the hospitals of today. The victims of the physician, the most agonizing pain is forced to flee and death is robbed of his victim. The good physician is a great blessing to the community. No power is more laborious, none more honorable, none more useful, none of greater power. The time when human nature feels its weakness is when it cries to the physician for help. "When you start to practice," said Mr. Lanceley, "you will be admitted into the secrets of the home life of your patients, and these secrets you must keep. The tempter, the blackmailer, the weak and the wicked will meet you at every turn. The vicious and wealthy will try to buy up your skill to cover up the traces of their iniquity."

"Take a year or two of hospital practice in Europe, where you can get into contact with the best physicians in the world, while every variety of disease passes under your notice. To be a competent physician you must be a complete man."

**WORKMAN WALKED INTO ELEVATOR**

Fred Kaiser Sustained Serious Injuries at Carling's Brewery on Saturday.

Fred Kaiser, an employee of the Carling Brewing and Malting Company, fell down the elevator at the brewery on Saturday, and was severely injured. He will be laid up for some weeks.

Kaiser was working on the first floor and did not notice that someone had run up the elevator upon which he had come down, from an upper story, a few minutes before. Both parties completed the job he was at, and he thought the elevator was in the shaft, and he walked directly into the opening. He fell a distance of sixteen feet, into the basement, and sustained very painful injuries. Dr. Mason, who was called, found that the man's arm was broken in two places—at the wrist and the elbow, and his nose was also broken. These injuries, he was terribly shaken up and bruised.

At the brewery it is regarded as a miracle that Kaiser was not killed. He is now at his home on the corner of Talbot and Sydenham streets.

**SUES FOR \$8,000 DAMAGES**

Mrs. Northey Brings Action Against Contractor Martyn.

Two new cases have been added to the list of the spring assizes, one jury and one non-jury.

The jury case is that of Northey vs. Martyn, in which the plaintiff, the widow of the late Frederick Northey, who was killed in December last while working at the military stores of the city, claims \$8,000 damages, alleging negligence on the part of Mr. Martyn, the contractor. Blackburn & Weekes for plaintiff, and Mr. T. H. Luscombe for defence.

The non-jury case is that of Kirk vs. Redmond, an action regarding a peat bog owned by defendant and which was partially transferred to the plaintiff for a certain sum. Both parties ask the court to settle. Stuart & Gunn for plaintiff and McKillop & Murphy for defendants.

## DULL AND DREARY WAS EASTER DAY

Weather Unfavorable, But It Didn't Keep Church-going London at Home.

Easter Sunday proved a bitter disappointment to the fair sex of London, and much new Easter headgear, because of the inclement weather, wasted its sweetness on the desert air of handboxes. From all standpoints, the weather man did his meanest, and it is time the ladies began an agitation for women's rights in this respect.

Spring millinery was at a discount. In the morning the rain precluded the possibility of one wearing a new hat, and the cold in the afternoon made furs look much more comfortable than flimsy spring styles.

The attendance at the many churches of London was very large, however, and the church-going Londoners, refusing to be kept in the house because of the bad weather. In all the churches special programmes of Easter music were rendered, and soul-stirring anthems swelled forth from choirs in every section of the city. In the Christian world, Christmas and Easter stand out above all other church festivals, and the triumphal music of the birth of the Saviour and the resurrection of the Redeemer moves nations as individuals.

Easter sermons were preached in all churches, many of the preachers of London devoting their attention to incidents in connection with the resurrection, upon which the truth of the Christian doctrine rests.

His Lordship Bishop Williams preached in St. Paul's Cathedral, and his Lordship Bishop McEvay preached in the evening at St. Peter's Cathedral. Bishop McEvay also blessed a new statue of St. Patrick in St. Peter's at the vesper service.

**"VACCINATED" IN EYE**

Inoculated by Lymph in Curious Manner as Result of Accident.

London, April 16.—By a simple misadventure, the first of its kind ever recorded in this country, a doctor practicing in a town near Manchester has become the victim of a peculiar and painful inoculation.

While breaking a small glass containing lymph for the purpose of vaccinating an infant, a particle of the glass flew up and struck him on the pupil of the eye, and adhering to the glass, was an almost microscopic quantity of calf's lymph. The doctor realized the danger of vaccination to which he was exposed, and immediately bathed his eye. So tender, however, is the skin of the eye that the glass made a minute scratch a day or so afterward the usual symptoms which follow inoculation gradually appeared.

The pain and discomfort which ordinarily arise from the operation in this instance are acutely aggravated, and he is going through exactly the same process as if he had been vaccinated on the arm. He cannot sleep, and in consequence the eye is never at rest, but it is not considered likely that the sight of the unfortunate doctor will be impaired.
