IRISH EVANGELISTS CONTINUE WORK

McCombe Brothers Preach to Large Congregations Sunday.

The Irish evangelists drew a large congregation to Colborne Street Methodist Church yesterday, morning and evening. Mr. C. Jeff McCombe preached in the morning, and in an interesting manner showed the influence memory has on a man's future and present.

He stated that man has three tenses—past, presided over by memory, present, by reason, and future, by hope. "Memory is that faculty which provides coal for man's hottest hell in this world and in the next. Memory of this world is the greatest hell, the memory of the sin committed. I believe heaven or hell starts here, and that in this world we can have a foretaste of both."

"There are men who would sooner shoot themselves than attend a revival, and they hate evangelists. But should Christ, by any chance, bring such men to heaven they would go to a policeman in that celestial city and say, 'Would you show me the way to get out.'"

"Your hottest hell would be the memory of the immoral service that brought November Sabbath when you left saying, 'I won't let that man overrule me.'"

"I believe that past, presided over by memory, is what keeps men from becoming Christians, and I don't believe men are refusing to accept Christ because of the difficulties ahead. Christ is greater than the difficulties. Memory holds on to that black sin, so be true to your best self and let the light of heaven shine on your hidden side. There is but one thing between your unsaved soul and Christ. He won't reach across your sins, but if you turn to him he will wash them away. 'Will you confess your hidden sins and be true to your best self? The issue is not between you and I, but between your heart and Christ.'"

KAISER AND VON BUELOW

Will Talk Over Trouble Today and Clear the Atmosphere.

Berlin, Nov. 15.—Emperor William is due to arrive at Potsdam tomorrow morning at 8 o'clock. He will have an audience with Chancellor Von Buelow during the day, but the hour of this meeting has not yet been fixed. Neither is it known whether the meeting will occur at Potsdam or in Berlin. These points will be decided by his majesty after his arrival.

It is pointed out today in a well-informed quarter that some of the newspapers of Germany have adopted a prematurely optimistic tone regarding the outcome of this meeting. However, officials are hopeful that the situation will be cleared.

BIBLE SUNDAY IN THE CHURCHES

Many Fine Sermons Preached to Further Work of the Society.

Anniversary Services Held in Askin Street Methodist Church—The Services in Other Churches.

Representatives of the Western Bible Society occupied the pulpits of the larger city churches yesterday, and set forth in a convincing manner the work the society is doing all over the world.

Rev. R. J. Bowen, travelling secretary of the society for Canada, spoke in the Memorial Church last night to an audience that completely filled the church. Mr. Bowen took his text from Jeremiah xv, 13. "Thy words were found, and I did eat them, and thy word was unto me the joy and rejoicing of my heart."

"In travelling through Canada from one end to the other," Mr. Bowen said, "one of the facts most impressed upon me this summer was the significance of old boys' reunions. If Canadian people only realized what this means they would be filled with a new sense of rejoicing. I took the trouble to look up the statistics on the subject, and find that there are at present in the United States nearly three million Canadians. The majority of these are young men and women, the life blood of the nation, and they are nearly all holding responsible positions and helping to build up another nation."

Population Leakage. "Owing to this leakage our population increases very slowly and Canadians may well take heed to the significance of the foreign emigration that is coming to this country. In Montreal there are now 40,000 Jews; in Toronto 15,000; in the west whole towns of foreign peoples. Sixty-seven different languages are now spoken in this country, while the church is represented by men speaking only twelve. In the west there are now whole towns, where the foreign population controls the vote, and it is sad to think that these people are strong enough right here in a Christian country to get what they want, and an instance is recorded of where the children tore down a picture of Jesus Christ and jeered at it before tramping it."

A Query. "What will Canadians do in a few years if these people continue to increase as they are doing? Canada's young men, going to another country, and their places being taken largely by emigrants from Southern Europe, many of them uneducated, and almost all of them without any knowledge of Christianity. Canada before heading the needs of India, China and Japan should deal with her own problem, which is greater than any of them. Since 1804, when the British and Foreign Bible Society was formed we have sent out nearly 210,000,000 copies of the Bible translated into nearly every tongue known. In Canada we aim to distribute Bibles to the foreign peoples, printed in their own language, and in English, so as to help Anglicize them. This work deserves the support of everyone who is interested in the advancement of his country and in the extension of Christ's kingdom."

Other Sermons. During the day other pulpits were occupied in the interests of the Bible Society as follows:

Rev. W. E. Hassard, of Toronto, district secretary of the Canadian Bible Society, spoke in the First Methodist Church in the morning, and in Dundas Church in the evening; Rev. R. J. Bowen, travelling secretary of the society, in St. Paul's Cathedral in the morning, and in the Memorial Church at night; Rev. W. B. B. Fraser, Presbyterian Church in the morning, and St. Andrew's at night; Rev. Jesse Gibson, Talbot Street Baptist Church in the morning, and First Congregational Church in the evening.

This morning representatives of the Bible Society started a canvass of the city for the purpose of collecting as much money as possible for aiding the work in Canada. Rev. W. E. Hassard, one of the secretaries of the Canadian Bible Society, spoke in the First Methodist Church yesterday morning. He said that whereas the city of London had given \$25,000 to missions last year, it had given less than \$500 to the work of the Bible Society. Mr. Hassard pointed out, that the work of the Bible Society is to go hand in hand, for in lands where no missionary or Bible reader is permitted to enter, the Bible gained an entrance, speaking to the people in the tongue in which they were born. Telling of the representative work of the society, who met the steamers from the old land and greeted these people on their first landing with the message of Christ. He told of the great work being done among the foreigners in some cities, emphasizing his remarks by telling illustrations, and ended by an appeal for aid in giving the Word of God in our own land to people of over 70 different tongues.

First Methodist Church. At the New St. James' Church last night Rev. Thomas Mitchell preached the sixth of a series of sermons on the seven deadly sins, taking as his subject, "Luxury." Luxury, said Mr. Mitchell, is the commission of that which is a great deal of effort to produce for the satisfaction of spurious means, that is, the gratification of the senses, of charity and humility, political economy condemns it, in the name of utility, and justice condemns it in the name of equity. It is pernicious to the individual and fatal to society. Luxury has done the grave of every nation that has perished. In concluding, Mr. Mitchell recommended to all the simple life, and as the greatest example of that life for all time, Jesus Christ.

A London Student. Mr. James Moore, of South London, a student of Woodstock College, occupied the pulpit in the South London Baptist Church last night, and preached an excellent sermon on "Friendship." Mr. Moore urged everyone to have as many good friends as possible, but to be most careful in their selection. Bad books, he said, were every one's enemy, and parents should be most careful what books they allowed in their homes. Mr. Moore's remarks were listened to with the greatest interest, and the congregation were greatly pleased with him.

Rev. Mr. Rutledge. The subject of Rev. Mr. Rutledge's sermon in the First Methodist Church last evening was "Going Up to Jerusalem." The text was Luke, xviii, 31: "Behold, we go up to Jerusalem." From his earliest conscious moment, Jerusalem was the goal of Christ's life, for he knew that somehow his earthly career would end there. Every life is a journey, and life's success or failure depends on the character of the goal towards which we are struggling. The trouble with the average youth is that he simply drifts. He has no clear, purposeful goal. The men or women who have accomplished anything in the world are they who have done one thing well. That is true also in the spiritual life. The goal of every life should be to be like Christ.

In going up to our own Jerusalem there is no time to loiter by the way. Life's serious duties are calling you. You must be about your Father's business. You are not to wait till every speculative question is settled. Life's work is too serious to spend any time imagining how much harm may come to you if you do certain forbidden things. You are a King's son going up to your kingdom, and the king's business demands haste.

There will be struggle, of course, but this should only strengthen and intensify your determination. It was so with Jesus. Whatever the struggle, go forth like men to face them. May God teach us first to see our own Jerusalem and then give us grace to attain it.

Talbot Street Baptist Church.

At Talbot Street Baptist Church last evening Rev. A. J. Vining spoke to a large audience on the subject, "Is Eternal Punishment Reasonable?"

From the Word of God, and from man's experiences in sin here, the preacher showed most conclusively that there is no alternative, but that there must be an everlasting torment for the person who deliberately and persistently chooses the path of sin. Mr. Vining said: "The two great pillars that will harass the soul of the unbeliever in the after-life are despair and remorse. He that despised Moses' law died without mercy under two or three witnesses. Of how much sorer punishment shall he be thought worthy who hath trodden underfoot the Son of God?"

of quite a debate. It is now thought, however, that the points of difference between the Trades and Labor Council and the liquor men will be adjusted, and the agitation will be dropped.

Postponed Action. The report of the committee in charge of the petitions was made, and a large number of signatures were submitted. The delegates were in favor of continuing the work, but negotiations had been entered into with the liquor men, and as these negotiations would be continued this week, it was thought advisable to postpone further action until next week.

Fair Wages. The committee also reported that a number of hotelkeepers have been interviewed, and they were prepared to see that as far as they could fair wages would be paid, and they would deal fairly with union goods.

No Vote Probable. The other hotelkeepers will be seen this week, and if all the points of difference are smoothed out, as it is expected they will be, the city council will not be asked to submit a vote.

Some of the delegates found fault with the reports in the newspapers, claiming that there has been no thought of secession of any union from the council.

There was a large attendance of members of the council.

DIRECTOIRES DOOMED

Leaders of Fashion in Paris Call Halt on Striking Costume.

Paris, Nov. 15.—Too much of the director style in gowns has offended certain leaders of fashion in Paris, and they have called a halt. They condemned modified expressions of the director for a time, but when the robe androgynous, with its divided skirt, came forth and flaunted itself unsparingly the present revolt started.

The young Duchess d'Uzes leads the women who are demanding a new fashion. They have not agreed upon a substitute for the director further than suggesting that the sleeves of the gown-to-be must be tight-fitting. The director really was introduced by dressmakers who are not classed in

the first rank. They were shrewd enough at the start to display the new fashion on beautiful models and customers took the bait.

The reform dress party, led by the duchess, is carrying its campaign to the Rue de la Paix, where are the shops of the best modistes. The latter are asked to originate a new style in opposition to the director and introduce it.

Paris is by no means absolute as a leader of fashions nowadays. It is the arbiter. Fashionable dressmakers launch new styles, but their success depends upon the manner in which they are received by the public.

The knell for wide hats has been sounded, also. In their place a mode described as the "Inverted flower pot" is meeting with favor.
