Detroit Tube Reaches U. S. Side

Windsor, Sept. 15. — Detroit and Windsor are now joined together in a manner that no divorce court judge can separate. The last section of the subaqueous portion of the Michigan Central tunnel was laid yesterday, and now two huge, circular lungs of steel and concrete connect the shores of the Detroit River.

If one were equipped with lights it would now be possible to walk from Windsor to Detroit under the great "dustless highway" which marks the international boundary line. Work on the tunnel is rapidly approaching completion. Trains will be running through about the first of the year unless something unforeseen occurs.

South London Leads. "South London takes the lead for new buildings and population, the increase in population there being 557, but the loss in the older and boarding-house part of the ward, reduced the total gain to 76. "The census can only be considered approximately correct, extending as they are over six months' work, and in the month of April many people moved into the territory that was assessed in the month of March, and afterwards you meet families in the last ward that had been assessed before."

BRAGANZA WEDDED TO AMERICAN HEIRESS

Miss Anita Stewart Becomes the Bride of Prince Miguel.

Dunbar, Scotland, Sept. 15.—Under a shower of evergreens and smiles, Miss Anita Stewart, daughter of Mrs. James Henry Smith, of New York, became the bride of Prince Miguel of Braganza at noon today in the Little Roman Catholic Chapel of St. Lawrence. The congregation of this church is made up of descendants of the clans who belonged to the faith in the days of Mary, Queen of Scots.

The scene of the wedding of Prince Miguel, a member of one of the proudest royal families of Europe, to Miss Stewart, the latest of the American heiresses to cross the Atlantic, was beautifully decorated. Rustic arches that led up to the church were covered with flowers and inscribed in Portuguese with the words, "God bless the prince and his beautiful bride."

The arch at the end of the avenue bore the words in English: "Long life and happiness to the prince and princess." The wedding party arrived at the church in motor cars. The bride was accompanied by her mother and her brother, W. R. Stewart, Jun., who gave her away. She was unattended by either bridesmaid or maid of honor.

The bride wore a graceful dress, carrying a long train of snow-white chiffon over soft satin. The chiffon was embellished by long lines of fine embroidery in white silk, silver and tiny pearls, made up of sprays of heather, fleur-de-lis and Portuguese devices. A veil of old lace

covered her face. The bride's hair was styled in a bun, and she wore a crown of pearls and diamonds. The bride's train was 18 feet long, and she carried a bouquet of white roses and lilies.

"SOMETHING FOR HIS BLOOD."

New York, Sept. 15.—After writing a note to a coroner stating that he had drunk a quantity of potassium because of "business" failure and failure of health, David W. Clark committed suicide in the Prince George Hotel in East Twenty-seventh street today. Mr. Clark was a member of the Blood & Conkling Varnish Company, of New York, N. J. He left a note requesting that his brother, Dr. A. M. Clark, of Youngstown, Ohio, be notified of his death.

Mr. Clark, who was a bachelor of 58 years, lived in the Prince George Hotel for several months. Early today when a merry party of young men and women returned to the hotel from the Coney Island Hotel, Mr. Clark remarked to one of the hotel employees that he "wished he was as happy as that crowd."

Later, in the presence of a bartender, who had just served him, he drank the poison, saying it was "something for his blood." He expired instantly.

JOHN BERGEN DEAD.

Cornwall, Ont., Sept. 15.—John Bergen, collector of customs here, died this morning at the age of 83 years. Mr. Bergen was a native of Ireland, but had lived here for the greater part of his life. He was a brother of the late Darby Bergen, M. D., member of Parliament for this district for many years and surgeon-general of Canadian militia during the rebellion of 1855. In his younger days Mr. Bergen, with his brother, was a well known breeder of thoroughbred horses and cattle. He was unmarried.

ARTIST SMILLIE DEAD.

New York, Sept. 15.—James Davis Smillie, a well-known artist and engraver, one of the founders of the American society of painters in water colors, died at his home in New York today at the age of 73 years.
