SUFFRAGETTE RIOT ENDS FATALLY

Leeds, England, Jan. 5.—The first fatality in England to result from a suffragette disturbance, occurred last night, when Alfred Hudson, a policeman, died from injuries received during a riot outside the Coliseum, on Aug. 18, last.

Sir Edward Grey, the foreign secretary, was addressing a mass meeting inside the building. An attempt by a large force of suffragettes to enter precipitated a riot, in which Hudson was injured internally.

A DUST EXPLOSION WRECKS BIG PLANT

Three Dead, Nine Paddy Burned in Buffalo Disaster.

Buffalo, Jan. 5.—The plant of the Buffalo Cereal Company was wrecked by an explosion in the grain dust last night. Three men are missing and supposed to be dead and nine others are in the hospital, frightfully burned. Eight of them, it is believed, will die.

The explosion occurred in what is known as the yellow corn mill. A concrete and brick elevator adjoining it was shattered by the force and crashed through the roof of the mill.

The wreckage of both caught fire and it was hazardous work for the men from the other sections of the plant to get out the unconscious and injured men.

The flames spread to other parts of the plant, practically all of which was badly damaged. It involved a financial loss of \$200,000. The firm manufactured several brands of breakfast foods.

FALLS DYING ON STREET

Well-Known Brantford Citizen Dies Suddenly From Heart Failure.

Brantford, Ont., Jan. 4. — S. M. Thompson, a well-known and highly respected citizen, at noon today fell unconscious on Bathurst street. He was carried into an office near by and medical aid summoned, but Mr. Thompson passed away immediately. It is supposed, from heart failure.

MENELIK NEAR DEATH, FOREIGNERS IN DANGER

A Disquieting Report Reaches Milan—Dying King's Grandson May Succeed Aged Monarch.

Milan, Italy, Jan. 5.—The foreign colony of Addis Ababa, the capital of Abyssinia, is in danger of attack by the natives, according to a dispatch received today by the Corriere della Sera, from its correspondent, who is en route to Addis Ababa, and who telegraphed his paper from Quorom.

The correspondent declares that the aged King Menelik is near death, and has turned the Government of Abyssinia over to Lij Jassu, his youthful grandson. A revolt against Lij Jassu, in which the foreigners will be involved, is said to be imminent. Many of the tribes have never acknowledged the authority of Menelik, and they are preparing for open rebellion the moment Menelik dies.

The foreign embassy is preparing to take refuge in the legation.

APPEALED AS MASONS

Grace and Cannon Unable to Save Themselves Through the Order.

Mexico City, Jan. 4.—Jose Santos Zelaya today strongly denied that Grace and Cannon were forbidden to communicate with the American consul, Mr. Caldera in Managua. Consul Caldera will hear me out in this, for when he received the appeal of Cannon and Grace he came to me to ask for their pardon.

It is true that General Medina appealed to me to save them, but I ground that they were brother Masons, and General Toledo objected to the execution on the ground of policy; but, inasmuch as the men were convicted in accordance with the Nicaraguan laws and a competent tribunal, I did not deem it wise to set aside the verdict.

A THRILLING RESCUE

Montreal Man Battles With Flames to Save Family.

Montreal, Que., Jan. 4.—A. F. Craig, a postoffice clerk, residing at 54 Schuyler street, had a thrilling time early this morning, rescuing his wife and six-year-old boy from a burning house. Craig got up early and lighted a fire in a bedroom where his son was sleeping, and went downstairs to light another stove. In the meantime the bedroom stove set fire to the room, and Mrs. Craig, rushing in to save her child, she, as well as the boy, was frightfully burned. Mother and child were driven to take refuge on the balcony with the thermometer ten degrees below zero, and Craig had to get through the next house to reach them, owing to the rapid progress of the flames. Craig was badly burned in rescuing his two other sons.

ROYAL MARRIAGES MAY BE ILLEGAL

Socialists and Catholic Parties May Harass King Albert.

Brussels, Jan. 4. — Le Soir asserts today that the marriage of King Albert and Queen Elizabeth, who was the Princess of Bavaria, was sanctioned by the King of the Belgians. Parliament, as is required by the constitution. The paper insists that sanction of the marriage by Parliament is imperative.

Since the confirmation of Leopold's religious marriage, the Roman Catholic papers seem disposed to raise a threat against future dynastic issues, unless King Albert submits to Roman Catholic influence.

MRS. SCOTT STILL QUITE INDIFFERENT

Outcome of Her Trial for Murder Does Not Appear to Worry Her.

READS A GREAT DEAL

Will Come Up Again Next Week—Big Batch of Cases Slated for the Winter Assizes.

Despite the fact that the second trial, which will in all likelihood decide her fate is drawing very near, Mrs. Scott, accused of the murder of her father-in-law, Harvey Scott, of Missouri, is showing no anxiety.

Indeed, she shows very little interest in the case at all. Her demeanor is at all times quiet and thoughtful, and she does nothing to cause the authorities the slightest trouble.

She lives the same life as other prisoners on remand and makes no complaint. A good deal of her time is spent in reading, and she has many friends, both in the city and the neighborhood where she lived, who are only too glad to keep her supplied with her books and other necessities.

Her brothers and other immediate relatives visit her quite frequently, and she seems always delighted to see them, and is apparently never happier than when talking quietly of the people she knows. At other times she is inclined to be very quiet, but when with people she knows personally she brightens up wonderfully.

In health she is greatly improved, and is a very different woman from the one who entered the jail nearly four months ago.

Michael Tierney, who will also appear at this session, is expected to answer to three charges of indecent assault, is at present out on bail, which was found for him after his appearance before Judge Elliott yesterday.

The only other criminal case is that of William Clarke, who will appear charged with criminal assault.

A Crystal Ball Case.

Another case, arising out of the Crystal Ball disaster of 18, 1897, has been added to the civil list. It is that of Margaret Boyd, who is bringing action against W. J. Reid and James Kennedy & Wilson for injuries received. Her claim is for \$5,000.

The plaintiff was walking on the sidewalk on Dundas street in front of the Crystal Ball when it fell out, the debris causing serious injury to her head and right side of her body.

Mr. E. T. Essery appears for the plaintiff, and Messrs. Gibbons, Harper & Gibson for the defendant Reid and Mr. J. M. McEvoy for Messrs. Kennedy & Wilson.

Action Against G. T. R.

Walter Barnett, who had both his legs severed in an accident on the Grand Trunk, has entered an action for \$20,000 damages against the Grand Trunk Railway Company.

Mr. J. P. Pauls acts for the plaintiff, and Mr. H. Biggar, of Toronto, for the company.

David Cummings is asking for \$5,000 damages against the same company. He was injured at Prairie Station on the Grand Trunk while firing on one of the company's engines. A switch was left open, and the train on which Cummings was working collided with another, in which collision, he claims, to have received permanent injuries.

MacKinnon against the Grand Trunk Railway Company, is another action for \$4,000 damages for injuries sustained by the plaintiff while firing on an engine at the Wellington street crossing.

President, Mr. J. F. Maher; first vice-president, Mr. Geo. Rowntree; second vice-president, Mr. B. G. H. Wright; third vice-president, Mr. S. Lancaster; fourth vice-president, Mr. E. F. Madden; secretary, Mr. T. Baker; treasurer, Mr. C. Talbot.

The executive were instructed to take such steps as they deemed necessary to carry out and complete the details for the perpetuation of the league, and while it is too early to anticipate what course may be adopted it is possible it may be along the line of the motto on the league cards, "75,000 Population in Ten Years," and "A Better London Than Has Been."

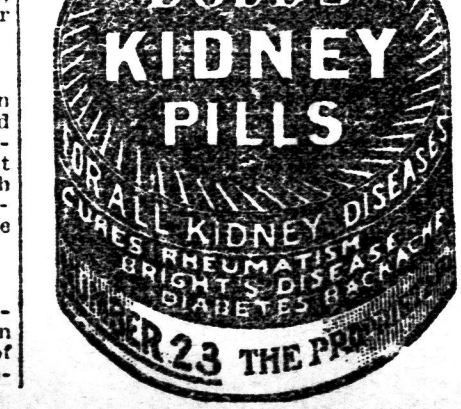
