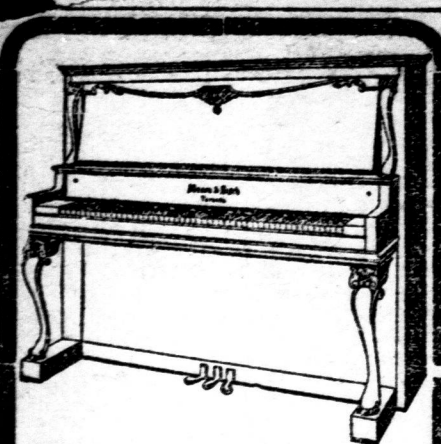

## CORRESPONDENCE

**The German Boyer Again.**  
To the Editor of The Advertiser:  
Mr. Daly takes me to task for characterizing Captain Wolley's address as "arrogantly Imperialistic and the like." At the same time my critic admits that he did not hear the address. Well, I did hear it, and it is just possible, I think, that I am better qualified to describe it than a person who did not hear it. Of course, Mr. Daly may say that he read the press reports. But these reports were not very full, and I noted that some of the possible facts in the widest statements were not given in them. There was, for instance, that quite characteristic remark of the captain, that "the other nations of the world, have not to come to heel and do as we tell them." I notice that Mr. Daly does not attempt to justify this frebrand utterance, though he attacks me for condemning it.

Mr. Daly's support of Captain Wolley rests fundamentally upon two assumptions, both of which are purely gratuitous. In the first place he professes to describe the relative attitude of Britain and Germany today as follows: "Captain Wolley is a double-barreled gun at your heart and offers some kind of flimsy excuse for so doing." I submit that this is absolutely unfair and an entire begging of the question. Mr. Daly has no right to make such charges against a man as a German would have to make against Britain. It is the notorious practice of the world, from the beginning of time until now, for people to declare the entire righteousness of their own cause and to picture every action of the foreign nations, even the most innocent, in the blackest colors.

Mr. Daly's other gratuitous assumption is that Germany is dangerous because the British lords of the admiralty, and "the statesmen of France, Russia and Great Britain" have virtually declared her to be so. In the first place this is an exaggeration of the facts in the case. Quite a respectable number of statesmen of Britain and France have declared that the German scare is utterly unjustifiable, and has been largely created by professional militarists or by political and other fortune hunters for their selfish ends. And even if the majority of British statesmen really believed that the scare was justified, there is good old authority for the statement that "Great men are not always wise."

History is full of tales of disaster and horror, and necessarily brought on nations by the bad judgment of their leading statesmen. Take typical cases, one from ancient history, one from modern. In the year B. C. 418, Alcibiades and the other leading statesmen of Athens, then at the height of her maritime imperial power, induced the assembly to accept an opportunity of making war upon the state of Syracuse, with the ultimate purpose of extending the Athenian Empire over the republic of Carthage and all its dependencies in the Western Mediterranean. The final result of this ambitious imperial enterprise was the entire destruction of the maritime power of Athens and her reduction to the rank of a minor state. The Athenian, Nicias, had opposed this expedition, but as he was not a leading statesman his opinion was not regarded; nevertheless he happened to be right.

Again, in the middle of the last century, the leading statesmen of England, taking exactly the same attitude towards Russia as some British statesmen are now taking towards Germany, and supported also by some of the leading statesmen of France, brought on the most infamous Crimean war. John Bright opposed that war, but he was not yet a leading statesman, and his opinion was disregarded. But he also happened to be right.

The leading statesmen who brought on the war afterwards came to acknowledge their error. Lord Salisbury voiced their regret and better judgment when he said, "We laid our money on the wrong horse." That is, in supporting Turkey against Russia. The hindsight of these imperialistic gentlemen was better than their foresight. But the tardy arrival of wisdom to these leading statesmen did not bring back to life and their homes and families the hundreds of thousands of men whose bones lay bleaching on the Crimean battlefields.

Oh, no my courteous critic, you cannot prove that a hostile attitude towards another nation is quite justifiable on the ground that some of our leading statesmen approve of it. They are but men, as the rest of us are. And not only are they liable to go astray in their judgments, but often they feel compelled by a wildly excited, though unreasoning public, to take warlike measures that their private judgment utterly condemns. That was the attitude of President McKinley and other leading American statesmen at the outbreak of the Spanish-American war, and similar conditions to some extent explain the attitude of some British statesmen today.

But who is so foolish today as to attempt to justify the Russian attitude towards the Spanish-American war, on the ground that leading statesmen approved of it?  
Mr. Daly seems to have a feeling that the Ruler of the Universe is of sort of tutelary divinity of British imperialists, and looks with approval on their arrogant pretensions. That attitude is quite Wolleyish. Wolley and Kipling also, as see the first four lines of "Recessional," but the idea of a tribal god who is specially interested in the native races is a little too primitive, as I hope, for most Canadians. **MOON WAS ECLIPSED BUT NOBODY SAW HER**

Observations Locally Handicapped by the Overcast Skies.

The total eclipse of the moon, scheduled for last night, was not plainly visible to Londoners. The stars were also invisible until a late hour, and had it not been for the electric lights London would have been left in heavy darkness. The moon entered the shadow at 5:44 p.m., the total eclipse began at 6:55, and ended at 7:47, the moon leaving the shadow at 8:58. The moon's diameter being 1, the magnitude of the eclipse was 1.181.

**Unique Representation.**  
Stratford Beacon: A St. Thomas man has put forward a unique idea on the subject of election of members of the city council. He thinks that every ratepayer ought to have a seat in it, and in order to obtain this would take them alphabetically as their names appear on the voters' list. Truth compels the conclusion that probably quite as good a choice would be got in this way in most cities and towns as by the present method. It would take a long time, however, to give everybody a turn with upwards of 3,000 names on a list, as is the case in St. Thomas and Stratford.

## WOULD JAIL THEM

Leading Lawyer Very Indignant Over Alleged Action of Trust.

Washington, D. C., Nov. 16.—Attorney-General Wickersham today exhibited indignation at published announcements that the Imperial Window Glass Company, of Pittsburgh, if the corporation could be stopped, popularly known as the "Window Glass Trust," intends to cut the wages of 600 to 700 employees 30 per cent as a result of the fines which a federal court recently imposed upon the corporation, its officers and directors. The Attorney-General confessed his disappointment at the small amount of fines imposed. One of the results of the court's action is that Mr. Wickersham is convinced that the breaking up of alleged criminal trusts must be accomplished through actual jail sentences rather than fines, and the department, it is declared, will work for that end in the future.

There is no way known to the department, Mr. Wickersham said, by which the corporation could be stopped from cutting the wages of its employees and attributing its action to the Government's prosecution, but Mr. Wickersham intimated that facts in his possession offered opportunity to proceed against some of the directors at another time.

**ARE PAYING UP**  
Many Ontario Bank Shareholders Are Responding to Call Made.

Toronto, Nov. 17.—While Ontario Bank shareholders are not compelled to remit their double liability contributions until Dec. 1, some have paid already.

If the entire 95 per cent call were collected in full, the liquidator would receive about \$1,200,000, but a proportion of the shareholders may not be able to pay, and, after all, the total available may not exceed the deficit, approximately \$300,000.

Roman Catholic separate school board of Amherstburg, and J. J. Ryan, sought to have declared invalid certain bylaws of the town of Amherstburg and of the county of Essex. **SOLD BAD FOOD**  
Investigation in New York Reveals Many Startling Conditions.

New York, Nov. 16.—Meat, so badly decayed that it has to be sprayed with sulphurous acid to conceal its condition, is being sold daily to the public, according to disclosures made by the municipal authorities' investigation into general food conditions here. Candy that has been treated with sulphurous acid to prevent stickiness, is sold to children, it was also developed.

The office of the commissioner of accounts is making the investigation, and a general cleaning-up is also being made of unclean bakeries and chicken slaughter houses. Investigation of bakeries shows that in over 50 concerns rotten eggs were used in the making of all kinds of cakes. Many of the eggs, known as "whites and spots," are brought from Philadelphia, where a strict enforcement of the law prevents their sale.
