RUSSIA BARS JEWS FROM CHRISTIAN NAMES

Holy Synod Issues Edict Despite Recent Decree of "Religious Liberty."

[Canadian Press.] St. Petersburg, March 30.—The holy synod today issued an edict prohibiting Jews bearing Christian first names.

The holy governing synod of all the Russias is the highest ecclesiastical authority in the Russian church. Its chief procurator represents the Emperor, who is the head of the church. The Emperor has never claimed the right of deciding theological and dogmatic questions, and the procurator enjoys wide powers in church matters.

BOMB EXPLODES AT P. C.'S COATTAILS

Doors of Building Blown In, But Constable Escapes.

[Canadian Press.] New York, March 30.—A blackhead bomb was exploded early today almost beneath the coattails of a New York policeman. The constable, making his regular rounds, was standing at the doorway of a tenement-house on First avenue, and the bomb was in the cellarway of the building, not a rod from his feet. He was uninjured, although the front of the building was damaged and doors and windows blown in.

4,000 WORKMEN IN BIG SOCIETY

Employees of Twenty-Two Factories Are Included in Organization.

Representatives of 4,000 workmen employed in 22 local factories and industrial concerns have organized a society to be known as the London Sick and Accident Benefit Association. Their purpose is to protect themselves against sickness and accident, and at the same time to escape the exorbitant rates exacted by insurance companies from such concerns.

Mr. J. C. Thompson, who proposed the scheme, has secured for the new organization an Ontario Government charter, and 22 of the leading factories of the city are included in the association, which has met with the favor of both employees and employers.

The funds of the association will be controlled by a managing committee of 22, one member from each concern interested in the organization. Meetings will be held in the M. C. R. ticket office through the courtesy of the M. C. R. agent, Mr. Evans.

ROMANCE DEAD?—NEVER

Here Are Two That Culminated This Morning in Old London.

[Canadian Press.] Ottawa, March 30.—Jean Le Champ, a French Count, claiming to be a count from France, and a poet as well, appeared in the police court today and received a sentence of two months for stealing the overcoat of Dr. Law, M. FOOTPRINTS PAID FOR COLLEGE COURSE

Grand Junction, Col., March 30.—A Colorado ranchman has paid for his college course at Colorado College from the footprints in the sandstone of his homestead near Grand Junction. Elmer Terrell has sold two more tracks, which he is digging from his ranch.

N. B. RAILWAY EXTENSION

Fredericton, N. B., March 30.—The New Brunswick Government is introducing a bill of Assembly legislation to provide for the extension of the New Brunswick Coal and Railway line from Minto to Fredericton, 31 miles. The line now runs from Minto to Minto, tapping the coal fields of Queens County. The legislation will provide for a bond guarantee of \$15,000 a mile, and stipulates that any company contracting to build the extension must have the present line purchased at least 100,000 tons of coal a year, and enter into a contract with the C. P. R. or other company under which the latter will take over the line on 99 years' lease, and equipment and operate, paying the province 40 per cent. of gross earnings.

"BUCKETING" LAW NOT CONSTITUTIONAL

Washington, March 30.—The amendment to the so-called bucket law which defines "bucketing" was declared unconstitutional by Justice Wright in the district of Columbia supreme court today, in that it deprived the citizens of the liberty to contract. PAPER FROM SUGAR CANE

Combined With Bamboo Fibre It Makes an Excellent Article.

Washington, March 30.—Another substance from which paper may be manufactured has been discovered by a manager of a sugar estate at Trinidad, according to the United States consul at that place. The new substance is ground sugarcane, to which is added bamboo fibre. The combining of these two, the discoverer believes, produces a substance of which the fibre is the right length to make a cheap and excellent paper. He has made paper by this process without the use of chemicals.

CHINESE POPULACE AROUSED.

Shanghai, March 30.—The action of China in submitting to the Russian demands is being resented by the populace. In the centre and south the anti-Manchu agitators are active, despite the censorship and official repression.

GREAT BRITAIN LAUNCHES ANOTHER BIG FIGHTER

The Super-Dreadnought Monarch Takes the Waters at Elswick.

[Canadian Press.] London, March 30.—The super-dreadnought Monarch was successfully launched at Elswick today. Thousands cheered as the fifth of the type of British battle ships took the waters. Mrs. Lewis Harcourt, wife of the colonial secretary, christened it.

A SALARY SCHEDULE FOR THE MINISTERS

Higher Stipends for Presbyterian Clergymen To Be Asked.

Toronto, March 30.—The minimum standard of stipend for ministers of the Presbyterian Church fixed by the General Assembly, will be paid this coming year if the augmentation committee is able to raise \$62,000 for the work. Last year \$48,000 was paid out to supplement stipends, and in order to obtain the desired amount the appointment of a field secretary by the General Assembly is to be recommended.

CHAMBERS' NEW PLAY

WIDEN SCOPE OF PROBE

Toronto School Board Will Now Look Into the Coal Contracts.

[Canadian Press.] Toronto, March 30.—As a result of the sensational evidence of Alfred Rogers, of the Rogers Coal Company, at the Love investigation yesterday afternoon, the board of education will at its next meeting pass a resolution instructing the judge to widen the scope of the inquiry so as to include the method of letting the coal contracts for the public schools. Trustee Lewis stated this morning that the resolution would undoubtedly be passed, and he proposed to move for it himself. Sensational evidence is promised when the new phase of the inquiry is reached.

DIES AS RESULT OF KISSING DEAD WIFE

Schenectady, March 30.—Albert Adams, aged 44 years, an expert violinmaker, died last night of pneumonia after three days' illness, following the kissing of the lips of his dead wife, who died last week of the same disease.
