HOW THE DINING CARS ARE SUPPLIED, ETC.

The travelling public seldom or never give a thought as to how or where the dining cars are supplied with everything the season affords. They are often heard to express themselves on the excellence of the different viands, but never give it a thought of how it reaches the table.

The Canadian Pacific have at a considerable expense equipped new supply depots at Vancouver and Winnipeg. The latest models of mechanical refrigeration enable the department to keep in perfect condition the choicest supplies from outside markets, for example, midwinter fruits, vegetables, etc.

A refrigerated storehouse has been erected at St. Thomas Junction in which are gathered at the approach of the winter season the finest fruit and vegetables produced by British Columbia. Two of these are at the present time featured on the menu cards in the west—Apples from the famous Okanagan Valley, and the British Columbia Championship Potatoes (which won the \$1,000 championship cup at the Irrigated Land Show in New York, November, 1910).

The company has opened bungalows for the accommodation of its dining-car employees at lay-over points, furnishing them with sleeping quarters, bathing, recreation, etc., and making them at least as comfortable as they would be at home. These facilities insure the patrons of the company being served by waiters in first-class physical and sanitary condition. In addition, every dining-car employee is required to undergo, periodically, a medical inspection, and to surrender a satisfactory certificate.

NOW TOTAL \$15,000

Sum Is Very Small, But Prospects Are Good for the Spring.

There is no stampede for building permits this month, the total so far being about \$15,000.

There is but one large permit, that of George White & Sons, for \$10,000, to reconstruct the addition recently destroyed by fire. There are other permits, but none of any size. In spite of the rather small showing, the total is much in advance of last January—in fact, is double, as the amount then issued was \$7,500.

However, there are many good contracts in sight, and the year will be one of the best in the history of the city. "Everything is most favorable looking," said City Architect Sutter. "We have a number of fine buildings in prospect, and there will be many others before spring."
