HOLD INQUEST IN ORANGEVILLE DEATH

Body of Prosperous Farmer
Was Found in the Hotel
Stables.

[Special to The Advertiser.]
Orangeville, Sept. 4. — The body of James Dale, a prosperous farmer and dairyman, of Caledon Township, was found in a stall in the stable of the Alexandra Hotel here early today and an inquiry into the circumstances surrounding his death was opened by Coroner James Henry this evening.

The evidence of James Robinson, the hostler at the hotel, revealed the fact that Dale and a companion had been drinking in the stable, and that the former had become intoxicated and had remained there all night. Robinson testified that he had seen Dale lying face downward in a stall. He could not say whether or not the man was dead at the time, for he closed the stable and went away without investigating his condition. This morning when he went to the stable Dale was lifeless.

J. Bennett, proprietor of the hotel, was unaware that Dale had been in the stable.

The news of Dale's sudden death caused considerable excitement in Orangeville, where he was well known. An autopsy was performed by Dr. H. Henry, but the report showing the causes of death was not ready for presentation at the inquest tonight. It will be received when the inquest is resumed on Monday night next.

Dale was 55 years of age and leaves a widow and two sons.

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OATS ARE BLACK AS RESULT OF SHOWERS

Farmers Unable Yet To Draw
In Any of the Grain
Cut.

Ingersoll, Sept. 5. — Although there have been two successive days of fine weather, the farmers have made very little progress in finishing their harvesting operations. The grain was so thoroughly soaked by the daily showers that in many places it is not yet fit to haul into the barn, although it is drying rapidly.

The fine weather, however, has been rather late to prevent serious damage. A number of farmers have stated that their oats in the field are very black, and that in some shocks they have already attained a growth of several inches. Now that the weather has apparently set in not a few prognosticators have ventured the opinion that the rainy spell will be followed by excessive heat and a drought.

It has been stated that the country could easily get along without rain for at least a month. The pasturage is good and the root crops are thriving; in fact, there is very little in the fields that requires frequent rains.

HORSES AND CATTLE KILLED BY LIGHTNING

Heavy Damage Was Caused
During Terrific Storm
Around Gorrie.

RUSSIAN GUNS SINK A RUSSIAN WARSHIP

Crews Mutinied and Fired On
the Forts, Which
Replied.

London, Thursday, Sept. 5. — The Constantinople correspondent of the Daily Chronicle says the crews of the Russian warships at Sebastopol mutinied and bombed the forts, which replied and sank one of the ships. Firing was going on vigorously when the telegram was sent from Sebastopol. One of the cruisers fled and has arrived at Barga, Bulgaria. The date of the occurrence is not given.

SHOTGUN EXPLODED AT CHARIVARI

Wedding Hazards Hurt When Weapon
Unexpectedly Went Off.

Kingston, Sept. 4. — Francis Baker and William Kell, two young men belonging to Wolfe Island, are in the hospital here in a serious condition as the result of the explosion of a shotgun while they were taking a prominent part in a charivari party at the island this morning.

The marriage took place on the island at 10:30 o'clock of James Berry and the daughter of Michael Shea, and Kell and Baker were members of a party which was made arrangements to give the couple a "send-off." While they are in a serious condition, it is expected that both will recover. One of the young men received about thirty grains of shot in the shoulder, and the other twelve in his head.

BELIEVE BRITAIN WILL ABANDON PLAN

Washington Diplomatic Circles Do Not
Expect Appeal to The Hague.

Washington, Sept. 4. — In diplomatic circles here it is said that the delay by Great Britain in asking for arbitration of the free tolls section of the Panama Canal Act is an indication that the British foreign office eventually will abandon that plan. It has been stated that the foreign office was withholding formal action pending a careful study of the act. It is believed that when the British Government comes to understand that the free toll provision of the act applies only to American coastwise trade, in which British shipping cannot participate in any event, the reason for an appeal for arbitration will disappear.
