Balkan States: "First, that the powers energetically reprove any measure susceptible of causing a rupture of the peace.

"Second, that, leaning on article 23 of the Treaty of Bertin, they will take in hand, in the interest of the Balkan ples, the realization of reforms in the administration of European Turkey, it being understood that these reforms shall not affect the sovereignty of the Sultan or the territorial integrity of the Ottoman Empire. The powers reserve to themselves liberty of action for a collective ulterior study of these

reforms. Third, that if, nevertheless, war breaks out between the Balkan States and the Ottoman Empire, they will permit, at the end of the conflict, no medification of the territorial status quo in European Turkey. The powers will make collectively to the Sublime Porte representations similar to the
