

THE POWERS' NOTE

Paris, Oct. 8.—The following is the note presented by the powers to the Balkan States:

"The Governments of Russia and Austria declare to the Balkan States:

"First, that the powers energetically reprove any measure susceptible of causing a rupture of the peace.

"Second, that, leaning on article 23 of the Treaty of Berlin, they will take in hand, in the interest of the Balkan peoples, the realization of reforms in the administration of European Turkey, it being understood that these reforms shall not affect the sovereignty of the Sultan or the territorial integrity of the Ottoman Empire. The powers reserve to themselves liberty of action for a collective ulterior study of these reforms.

"Third, that if, nevertheless, war breaks out between the Balkan States and the Ottoman Empire, they will permit, at the end of the conflict, no modification of the territorial status quo in European Turkey. The powers will make collectively to the Sublime Porte representations similar to the declaration."

GENERAL BALKAN WAR IN FORTY-EIGHT HOURS

Opening of Hostilities by Montenegro Believed To Be Merely Beginning of Struggle That May Involve Some of Great Powers.

Paris, Oct. 8.—A general conflagration in the Balkans is expected by officials here within 48 hours. Montenegro's declaration of war against Turkey is regarded merely as the beginning. It is believed that the other units in the Balkan coalition will follow suit as soon as the mobilization of their armies is complete. There is only a faint hope now that the representations of the powers will avert general hostilities.

Montenegro's move is considered in Paris to be all a part of a prearranged plan. It is asserted that Greece was first selected by the Balkan confederation to force the issue and inaugurate the war. This could easily have been done by Greece seating in the Greek Parliament the deputies from Crete, which was certain to prove a casus belli to Turkey. Greece, however, declined to accept responsibility for starting the flame of battle.

Montenegro was then picked for the task. She had a long-standing quarrel with Turkey over the boundary question, and Turkey's refusal to grant satisfaction was seized upon as justification for Montenegro's resort to arms.

KILLED THE BABY

Little Berlin Child Played on Grand Trunk Tracks.

Berlin, Oct. 8.—Another fatality occurred in the Polish section of the city late yesterday afternoon when Rosie, the 17-month-old daughter of Martin Zoblifsky, of 91 Charles street, met death beneath the wheels of Grand Trunk freight cars. The child was playing in front of its parents' house on a railway siding. She was apparently sitting on the tracks, as the wheels of the cars cut the body completely in two.

The train moved out of the siding and the trainmen were not aware of the accident until they were notified at the yards. The mother of the child was seriously stricken upon learning of the accident, and slight hopes are entertained for her recovery. Dr. J. F. Honsberger, the coroner, has ordered an inquest this evening.

BROKE HIS LEG

Roadmaster Hickey Was in Bad Smash Near St. Thomas.

[Special to The Advertiser.] St. Thomas, Oct. 8.—Timothy Hickey, Michigan Central Railway roadmaster, of this city, met with a serious accident today, while inspecting the road on a gasoline speeder ten miles west of St. Thomas. The speeder jumped the track and threw the roadmaster, his assistant, J. G. Kennedy, and an engineer named Houston with great violence to the ground. Mr. Hickey's injuries consist of a fractured leg and severe cuts on his head. The other two men escaped with bruises and a severe shaking-up.

THOUSANDS OF BARRELS OF THE FINEST APPLES

UNION DEFENCE IS OUTLINED IN DYNAMITE CASE

Counsel Says "Jobs" Referred To in Correspondence Meant Work For Men.

BELIEVE ONLY THREE IN CRIMINAL WORK

Declares That the Funds of Ironworkers Were Not Diverted for Illegal Purposes.

Indianapolis, Oct. 8.—What the defence will be in the trial of the 45 men accused by the Government of complicity in the "dynamite conspiracy" was outlined before the jury today by William N. Harding, attorney for the defendants. Mr. Harding said at the outset it would be shown that the executive board of the International Association of Bridge and Structural Ironworkers never appropriated a dollar to be used for dynamiting. He asked the jury to suspend judgment until after the witnesses had testified. If anyone connected with the union diverted the funds for any illegal purpose, the guilty persons, he said, would be shown were not among the present defendants.

"When you have heard all the testimony," said Mr. Harding, "we think you will have concluded that about three men were engaged in the nefarious work of dynamiting and that those three men already have pleaded guilty."

Referring to letters written by Frank M. Ryan, president of the Ironworkers, which the Government quoted as showing that "jobs" was the term used to designate explosions against employers of non-union labor, Mr. Harding said it would be shown that "jobs" meant only new work which offered a security for union men to get employment. He added it would be upon the very letters which the Government quoted in the indictment that the defence expected to rest its case.

The district attorney completed his address to the jury of 23 hours, covering five days.

DUTTON HORSE DEALER DROWNED IN TORONTO

Alex. McWilliam Walked Off Docks Into Lake When He Lost His Way.

[Special to The Advertiser.] Toronto, Oct. 9.—Alex. D. McWilliam, aged 52, of Dutton, one of the best-known horse dealers in Western Ontario, was drowned last night, when he mistook his way, and walked off the docks at the foot of Church street in the darkness.

Mr. McWilliam came to Toronto yesterday to dispose of a lot of horses. At about 10 o'clock he left his hotel in company with a friend, James Dickie, also of Dutton, to visit some parties on Church street.

Unused to the city, the two men missed their direction and instead of going north on Church street, walked south to the bay. In the inky darkness which surrounds the docks at this point McWilliam, who was in advance, stepped off the edge of the pier into the waters of the bay.

Dickie went to his assistance with a plank, but the plank proved too short, and after twice coming to the surface, the doomed man sank.

His friend then ran to a hotel and notified the police. Detective Elliott, with the aid of a silk pole recovered the body about an hour later.

It was taken to the city morgue. McWilliam was married. He was known as the tallest man in his country, standing full six feet six inches, and weighing nearly 275 pounds.
