MAY DEPORT FOUR

RAILWAY CLERKS TO HAVE SALARIES CUT BY \$12.24 A MONTH

35,000 Workers Will Be Magistrate Tells Quartet To Affected by Change.

Montreal, Aug. 2.—Wage reductions to be assessed against clerical staffs of Canadian railways in conformity with the gen al reduction made effective July 16, have been worked out. Clerks and all those coming under that gen-eral classification will be reduced \$12.24 er month, and those classified as office ber month, and those classified as office boys by \$10.20. It is stated that approximately 35,000 workers will be affected by these two changes. Notification of the new rates of pay has been forwarded to those affected.



The condition of the singer, which had been considered satisfactory until

recently, became very grave yester-day, peritonitis developing, and an-other operation being considered neces-sary. From the beginning of his relanse, however, there was serious concern over the outcome, and last night his life was despaired of. During the night the condition of

the patient grew worse steadily, and the career of the great artist came to an end with his death at an early hour this morning. When the tenor sailed from New York on May 28 he appeared to be still very ill and weak, although his physician in-

sisted that he was on the road to rapid recovery and would soon regain his health abroad.
