Cork. April 11 .- The city corporation today decided, by a vote of 18 to 13, to grant Henry Ford the site of his tractor factory here in fee simple. When the corporation recently issued a threat of eviction, the American automobile manufacturer sent a cable message to the effect that unless he was granted the lands in fee simple he would move the factory elsewhere.

A Cork dispatch early in March said all construction work and installation of equipment at the Ford factory had been discontinued in onsequence of the Cork corporation's action in calling on the company to comply with the alleged conditions of the lease. One of these conditions was said to provide that the firm employ a minimum of 2,600 men for five years. It was charged that fewer than this number were being em-


