Attitude of Meeting of Middlesex Milk Producers Addressed by Dr. H. W. Hill.

Cries of "No! No!" and "Put it to vote" were common when pasteurization and the tuberculin test were being explained to the Middlesex Milk Producers' Association Friday night at Hyman Hall.

The speaker was Dr. H. W. Hill, director of the Institute of Public Health. He was addressing probably

the largest and most representative gathering of milk dealers ever as-sembled in this city. Dr. Hill explained that tubercu-losis was found in many forms, one of which was the bovine tuberculosis found in cattle, and which was easily contracted by human beings. It was unlike the form found in poultry, which could not be contract-

But even if the disease was not contractible by human beings he took as a supposition farmers should still be desirous of ridding their herds of the dread disease, since an affect-ed animal conducted the tuberculosis to other cows, and thereby lessened the value of the herd. 
