

erally admitted that there is a scarcity of hides the world over, and despite the fact that at present high prices there is no money for tanners, the chances are that the latter will have to pay still higher prices. This means an advance in the price prices. This means an advance in the price of leather, which is gradually hardening and must appreciate. In fact, boot and shoe manufacturers have abandoned the idea of buying leather at lower prices, especially as it is now recognized that tanners are at the mercy of hide men. The sale of about 12,000 fall hides is reported by the Montreal Hide Association for American account on p.t., but believed to be at 9c here. These hides have been held over since last fall, and are of course of the best quality. Last week 3,000 night cowhides were sold in Chicago at 9½c, which almost staggered the trade. In New York on Tuesday last 1,200 native steers were sold at 9½c for No. 1, and 8½c for No. 2, with a general stiffening of prices all round, including dry hides. An advance is looked for in this market next week, as is looked for in this market next week, as the above large sale has about cleared this market of all accumulations. About 8,000 of the above hides sold here are for Olean, N. Y., and about 4,000 for New York.
