London, June 28.-Sir Michael Hicks-Beach, Chancellor of the Exchequer responding to a personal toast at the panquet of the bankers and merchants of London at the Mansion House this evening, and referring to the diminuion of the gold reserve of the Bank of England and the great increase of the world's gold, said:—"Some persons seem to entertain alarm because, al though London is the great market for the world's gold, this vast increased product seems to have passed us by and to have taken permanent abode in the United States and Russia. In 1891, Mr. Goschen, Chancellor of the Exchequer in that year, expressed a strong opinion on this matter, but the elation between the Bank of England and the money market has been greatly changed by the rise of the great private joint stock banks. To arrange this reserve so as to meet the require ments of foreign countries and of the banks that have deposited with the Bank of England, will be the great object of my office, though the mater need not cause any alarm.'
