NASHVILLE, Tenn., Dec. 13.-President Gompers in his report to the seventeenth annual convention of the American Federation of Labor, to-day repeated and emphasized the statement he made in his call for the convention, that it had his call for the convention, that it had to deal with questions momentous for dignation and lively warefare is being labor.
