SHIPBUILDING.
The prospects seem bright for the establishment of a shipbuilding plant here and the town and citizens should give the promoters every encouragement.

The need of ships is one of the most pressing in the successful prosecution of the war, and help in this way is a very important phase of war work.

So far as we are aware the McLennan Foundry & Machine Works, Ltd., have not approached the town for any special concessions in the way of a free site or tax exemptions, but when they do so we feel confident that they will be generously dealt with.

We trust that no obstacles will be thrown in the way to prevent the laying down of at least one vessel.

NOT EVEN GERMAN SILVER.
One of many articles turned in for conversion into money for war purposes in the United States was a "magnificent \$5,000 prize cup," presented by the Kaiser for American competition. The assayer reported it a typical German gift—gilded pewter worth about forty dollars.

Whatever differences of opinion exist to-day as to the relative merits of the Borden and Laurier naval policies there must be unanimous agreement that the true naval policy for Canada is the construction of merchant shipping. A true patriot is every man who helps increase the country's carrying tonnage.—E.S.

COST OF FOOD CONTROL.
Over and above the small license fees charged to dealers in foodstuffs, the total cost to Canada of the Food Board, since it was organized by Mr. Hanna in June, 1917, has only been \$57,430.50, according to a statement made by Mr. H. B. Thomson, Chairman of the Board at an address in Toronto on May 15th.

IT IS UP TO THE TOWNSPEOPLE.
The able-bodied young men in Canada are at the front or in training. The farmers have done their best and the crop is in the ground. The harvest is up to the townspeople. Unless they organize to help, the people of this country will have to tighten their belts next winter. There is no doubt about it.

THOUSANDS NOW UNDER LICENSE.
Up to date something like 25,000 licenses have been issued to dealers in foodstuffs by the Canada Food Board. Another 100,000 have still to go out. These include wholesale and retail grocers, wholesale fish dealers, bakers, wholesale produce dealers, fruit and vegetable dealers, millers and cereal manufacturers. In addition to these are some 17,000 public eating places to be under license by July 1st.

UNLICENSED EATING HOUSES ILLEGAL.
On and after Saturday, June 1st, it becomes illegal for restaurant keepers to remain in business unless they have a license from the Canada Food Board. This applies also to boarding houses, serving twenty-four meals per day to outsiders, other than the household or members of the family.

INCREASED ACREAGE IN THE EAST.
Dr. J. W. Robertson, after a tour of the Eastern Provinces, says that the farmers of Eastern Canada are increasing the acreage for wheat, barley, rye, oats, peas, beans, fodder potatoes and other roots. An increased acreage of about 2,000,000 acres is aimed at in the five Eastern Provinces.

UNDER PROHIBITION.
Westernland county ceased to be a South Act county Monday at midnight, and is now under the Provincial Prohibition Act. The required notice was published in the Canada Gazette and the time for the automatic coming into effect of the Prohibition Act in Westernland County was June 11. Rev. W. D. Wilson, chief inspector, has just concluded a tour of Sackville, Dorchester and other points in the county for organization purposes. The question of inspectors and vendors is being attended to but no announcement has been made as yet.

NECESSARY STEPS TAKEN TO CHECK SPREAD OF DISEASE.

No Cause for Uneasiness Regarding Spinal Meningitis in Depot Battalion Say Authorities.

Local military authorities announced yesterday that there was no cause for any unnecessary uneasiness in connection with the quarantine placed on Camp Sussex owing to the prevalence there of three cases of spinal meningitis. Everything was being done that would tend to check the spread of the disease and things at present were assuming a satisfactory aspect and the situation is well in hand. Lieut. Colonel James L. McAvity, camp commandant at Sussex and Dr. Kenneth Mahabir, specialist, were in the city yesterday in conference with local military headquarters. While here the military officials discussed the situation and made all necessary preparations to meet any possible exigency that might arise.

NOT NECESSARY TO RESIDE IN CANADA

Separation Allowance to Soldiers' Wives Wherever Located—News of the Soldiers.

Orders have been received from Ottawa to the effect that a decision had been reached extending the payment of separation allowance to dependents not living in Canada. Hitherto such separation allowances have been paid only to relatives of soldiers actually in Canada.

GERMANS MAKE DARING ATTEMPT TO ESCAPE FROM CAMP IN ENGLAND

A daring attempt to escape from England by crossing the English channel in an ordinary rowboat was made the other day by two escaped German prisoners. They were caught on a dark night by a patrol at a point on the coast nearest Zeebrugge, their objective.

The prisoners who were dressed as seafaring men, wearing blue serge suits and high boots, had traveled about sixty miles from their camp near Salisbury Plain. One who spoke English fluently made no secret of their intention. When searched they had between them nearly the equivalent of five dollars in silver. About a mile along the beach from the spot where they were captured they had concealed, beneath a boat, bags of biscuits, together with bread and fruit; a razor, shaving brush and a large bottle of water.

GERMAN RESERVES DWINDLING; BOYS AMONG PRISONERS

French Headquarters, June 10.—The German reserves are being depleted in the constant fighting from Noyon to Chateau Thierry and from Vermeil to Rheims. His reserves of manhood are declining.

Out of 200 prisoners taken in the first days of June, over one-fourth belonged to the 1913 class, and the class of 1920 made their appearance on the battlefield among the prisoners captured at Bligny by the British. A considerable proportion being lads of this class.

FIVE BURNED TO DEATH IN OWEN SOUND FIRE.

Owen Sound, Ont., June 11.—Five occupants of the home of Richard Lyons, Euphrasia township in the remote part of Grey County lost their lives in a fire which destroyed his residence at an early hour on Sunday morning last. The dead are: Mr. Lyons, his wife, their eight-year-old son Lawrence, Miss Effie Neely a farmette, student at Markdale High School, and Aulde McLaughlin, a four year old boy from Owen Sound.

An inquest was ordered by the assistant coroner at Markdale and a jury was empanelled on Sunday last and after viewing the remains adjourned for a week.

LEAVING METHODIST PULPIT FOR PRESBYTERIAN CHURCH.

Chatham World.—Rev. Dr. C. M. Squires, of Newcastle will preach in St. Andrew's on Sunday. It is understood that the Doctor, who has resigned his pastorate of the Methodist church in Newcastle, is about to join the Presbyterian church with the view of getting a pulpit of a college professorship in that body. The minimum salary in the Presbyterian Church in Canada is \$1200.

COMMENT ON THE SESSION AT OTTAWA.

(Montreal Journal of Commerce.) The work of the recent session of the Dominion parliament was in most respects creditable to the union government.

Many measures of an important character were passed. The huge appropriation for the war service was voted without dissent in any quarter. The supplementary legislation respecting military service was carried on division, without any protested opposition. The new taxation was accepted with, but little dissent. The Women's Suffrage Act and the Civil Service Act were notable measures. Seldom, if ever before was so much important legislation enacted in so short a time.

Where there was so good a record in this respect, all the more pity it was marred towards the close of the session. The grave mistake of the premier in creating a ministerial crisis over such a question as that concerning titles had already been referred to these columns. Another serious mistake was the unseemly determination to rush business through the two houses without allowing decent opportunity for enquiry and discussion. For this the government must be held chiefly responsible. The opposition are not free from blame. They might have prevented the spectacle, and they did not do so. As the people look at the events of the closing days, they will wonder how the public business could have been so treated. The voting of the post office appropriation is an example.

The voting of the sums set down in the estimates is the proper occasion when the members are afforded practically the only opportunity for intelligent discussion of the business of the several departments. There is no department that comes closer to the people than the post office. There were many matters concerning that department which members desired to discuss. The post office estimates were never taken up during the session until an hour and a half before the time fixed for prorogation. In that short time the house was asked to vote about twenty million dollars for that department, besides many millions for other services, and to dispose of the numerous motions incidental to the closing up of the session's work. One newspaper says the house voted over sixty million dollars in as many minutes! If the house had found itself at the close of a very long and wearisome session, some excuse—not a good one even then—might have been found for what happened. But there was no excuse. So far as time was concerned, there had not been half a session.

Why then were the members not asked to remain at their posts long enough to discharge their duties with some appearance of efficiency? The only excuse offered was that the premier and several of his colleagues were desirous of leaving for England. That is the poorest kind of reason. It carries an implication that is not flattering to the cabinet generally, for it suggests that they were not deemed capable of carrying on business without the presence of the four gentlemen who were about to leave. The cabinet is now quite a numerous body. Four members could go away, and there would still be a large brigade to attend to duty. To drive the house and committees for many days from ten o'clock in the morning until the early hours of the next morning, and then at the last stage throw a week's business into a couple of hours, going through the farce of voting a million dollars a minute without discussion, was not a creditable winding up of a session which, under fairer conditions, would have left a fine record of efficient legislative work.

AMOUNT INVOLVED

IS ABOUT \$150,000

Province's Alleged Claim Against Miramichi Lumber Company.

Fredericton, June 7.—The Government probably will conclude its session this evening. Representatives of the Miramichi Lumber Co., were before the members in connection with the alleged claim of the province against the Company on account of pulpwood cut on crown lands, contrary to regulations, and exported. Mr. J. W. Brankley, of Chatham, representing the company, is here in connection with the matter; also, Mr. George M. Sissara, of Portland, Me., president of the International Pulp and Paper Company.

This claim was frequently referred to during the last session of the Legislature. The amount involved is about \$150,000.

MEN 19 TO 23 ONLY

TAKEN FOR FLYING CORPS.

Ottawa, June 10.—Word has been received in Ottawa that no further recruits can be taken at present for the Royal Air Force, except recruits between nineteen and twenty-three. Even those, if accepted, will only be put on the reserve with the promise that they will be called up for service some time next fall or winter. In other words, it has been decided not to take any men between nineteen and thirty-four for the Royal Air Force, who are affected by the Military Service Act.
