

ASSASSINS DOG THE CAR.

A SECOND ATTEMPT TO KILL THE RUSSIAN EMPEROR.

The attack reported as Berlin and Copenhagen but there has been no official notification of it sent to the British Government.

Berlin, April 1.—Russian advice state that the execution of the persons actually concerned in the recent attempt upon the Emperor's life has been postponed in the hope of obtaining further disclosures from them regarding the plot. The chief prisoners are confined in the Schlesselburg fortress, and the remainder in the St. Petersburg citadel. Quantities of explosives and dangerous contraband papers have been found in the possession of one of the prisoners. A general wife and a mother of a child were also implicated in the plot. Some of the prisoners had a quantity of money when arrested. They refused to give any information. Threats of the conspiracy were discovered at Charkoff, Kiev, Warsaw, Moscow, Odessa and Novy Tcherkassk.
