

He said he believed those interests dearest to the convention would be best served by an adjournment until to-morrow morning in order to give the convention time to have a more thorough understanding and to prevent lasty and unconsidered action. He therefore moved to adjourn until 10 o'clock to-morrow morning, and upon this motion he demanded a call of the roll of states.

There was at once a half-dozen seconds to the motion and the call was ordered. It resulted in a vote of 535 years to 282 nays. The chair then declared the convention adjourned until 10 o'clock to-morrow.

EVA HARRIS' ALLEGED CRIME. Before a Coroner's Jury on a Charge of Concentment of Birth, At the Police Court last night Coroner Duncan and a jury were engaged four hours in investigating the cause of death of a newborn child which was found dead in the room born child which was found dead in the room of the mother, Eva Harris, at 327 Yougestreet. This was the adjourned inquest, and the facts of the case have already appeared in The World. The witnesses examined were Mr. and Mrs. Pitts, with whom Miss Harrishas been a servant since 1882, Doctors McPhedran and Nevitt, Detectives Black and Burtows, Iand a hospital nurse. Nothing very insterial was elicited apart from the evidence of Dr. Nevitt, who had made a post mortem examination. He testified that the cause of death was loss of blood. The child really died from the want of proper attendance at the time of birth. The Doctor did shot attribute any negligence or wrong did not attribute any negligence or wrong doing to the mother. When in the hospital she told her master that at the birth of the child she fainted and when she recovered the child was dead. She concealed the body ander the register.

It was industry when the jury returned their verdict: "That the child came to its death through the carelessness of the mother in not providing medical attendance." The jury recommended that proper provision be made at the jail for the care of persons charged with some who may not be in a cendition of with crime who may not be in a condition health to allow of their being placed in ordinary cell.
