Tickets Sie. Hew to Calculate the Discount. The article in restorday's World on the dis-forent methods of calculating the discount on ras bills attracted any amount of attention and filed our mail bay with solutions. Some of these are quite intricate; one, however, seems the simplest of them all and ought to be adopted by the Gas Co. and commers gener-ally. It is this: Divide the number of feet by reight and the quotient is the net amount of the bill in cents, or to put it more atacily divide the number of feet by eight hundred and the quotient is the arswor in dollars.
