

REDS PREPARE FOR NEW ATTACK

Said to Have Seventy-Two Divisions in Readiness

CONSTANTINOPLE REPORT

Said British Leave Kasvin on Arrival of Red Force

CONSTANTINOPLE, Jan. 30.—(Associated Press Cable.)—Secret instructions regarding the "next Russian Bolshevik offensive" have been given army leaders by Leon Trotsky, Soviet minister of war, at a conference just concluded at Moscow. It is asserted that Zolotarev has 22 divisions of infantry and 20 divisions of cavalry along the Polish and Rumanian fronts. Reports received here state that the Soviet government has established six army headquarters, which are located at Baku, Kazan, Rostov, Moscow, Perm and Omsk.

Tartar Bolshevik troops have entered the town of Kasvin, 90 miles north-west of Teheran, and British forces in the latter city are reported to have begun a withdrawal. It is said in dispatches received here to-day.

RUSSO-POLISH CRISIS

COPENHAGEN, Jan. 30.—A dispatch to the Politiken from Riga says a crisis has arisen in the Russo-Polish peace negotiations. M. Dombiski, the Polish representative, demanded 70 million gold rubles from Russia, but M. Joffe, the chief Russian representative, declined to offer more than 30 million. The dispatch adds that both the delegates have declined to sign the points of the treaty already agreed upon.

A GOOD LESSON TO THE GERMANS

Allies' Demand Shows Them No Trifling Goes

LONDON, Jan. 30.—(Associated Press Cable.)—The London Times in an editorial on the Paris conference, says that the settlement may be open to objection in more respects than one, but has "the supreme merit that it consecrates anew the solidarity of the allies."

It continues: "The conclusions are drastic enough to teach Germany that the allies do not mean to be trifled with any longer. They are not inconsistent with her economic restoration and they are not—despite the German outcry—unreasonable in any other respect. If Germany refuses, the Times adds, the allies will be compelled to apply to the letter the terms of the treaty."

FRENCH PRESS PLEASED

PARIS, Jan. 30.—(Associated Press Cable.)—Satisfaction with the decisions arrived at yesterday by the supreme allied council regarding German reparations was expressed unanimously by a number of newspapers here to-day. Many journals praised Premier Briand for the manner in which he conducted the interests of France during the sessions of the council.

"Yesterday was, perhaps, the happiest and most important day we have known since the armistice," said the Petit Parisien, the Government organ. "At last we shall be able to negotiate abroad bonds of the Germany treasury corresponding to our share of the first annual payment for reparations. Exchange will in a few months be improved and stabilized, trade will revive, there will be an end to idleness and the cost of living will be reduced."

President Millerand was given praise for his work in inaugurating a policy which is considered to have resulted in complete success for France.

"FARMERS ONLY," MORRISON SAYS

U. F. O. Secretary at Chatsworth Reaffirms Views

CAUSES OF FAILURE

Brightest Boys Have Left Farm for the Cities

OWEN SOUND, Jan. 29.—J. J. Morrison, secretary of the U. F. O., delivered an address at Chatsworth last night, in which he reaffirmed his recently stated belief as to "broadening out." Questioned as to Premier Druay's attitude, he said he would let him speak for himself.

Mr. Morrison made clear his opposition to allowing any other interests besides those of the farmers to become identified with the United Farmers of Ontario.

"The U. F. O. should be composed of farmers only," he said. "It is absurd to think of allowing any other section to be included. Their interests are not the same."

The speaker said that the failure of the farmers in the past had been that they lacked self-consciousness. They had not respected their own calling for that they bring in any other section to the cities to take up the professions and to engage in business. He urged the audience to adopt an entirely different attitude and to keep their best sons at home to develop farming along the right lines.

Mr. Morrison condemned the old system of party government, and agreed that the recall was the only safe system of constitutional government. Some time was also spent dealing with the co-operative system of the U. F. O.

The late Mr. Houghton superintended the opening of the "Yellowstone Path," the first railroad through the Rocky Mountains, and he took part in constructing tracks through Northern Canada. He was superintendent of the Wabash Railway at the opening of the St. Louis Exposition. He was a member of Alpha Lodge, A. F. & A. M., of Toronto. He is survived by his widow, Mary B. Houghton, one son, Francis E. Houghton, of Los Angeles; another daughter, Mrs. E. S. Keay, of New York City, and two sisters, Mrs. Floyd Overton, of Adams, N. Y., near Watertown, and Mrs. William Wiley, of Massapequa, Long Island, N. Y.





RECEIVED 13,200 VOLTS

GALT, Jan. 30.—The inquest into the death of Albert Wiley, 23 years old, hydro lineman, of Hamilton, who was electrocuted here on Saturday morning, was adjourned until Tuesday night, when witnesses will be called. From what can be learned it would appear that deceased went up the wrong side of the pole and came in contact with live wires, those on the other side being dead to permit the changing of insulators, which had given trouble recently. He received 13,200 volts, and is believed to have died instantaneously. He fell 40 feet. Among his effects was found a notice in case of accident to notify "Doc" Wiley, 44 Walnut street, Bradford. The remains still lie in the morgue here.

HIGHER PAY FOR ST. THOMAS FORCE

Patrolmen Will Draw \$130 to \$140 a Month

REVOLVER PRACTICE
Mayor Brinkman to Supervise Small-Arm Class

ST. THOMAS, Jan. 30.—(By Staff Reporter.)—In order to combat efficiently the present wave of crime in this city and district the local police force, from the chief to the newest policeman, will

begin early this coming week to attend a daily revolver practice. Mayor Frank L. Brinkman has been appointed official trainer and will supervise and make all arrangements for the target practice.

This decision was reached by the police commission yesterday afternoon. Mayor Brinkman expressed the opinion that although the members of the force are quite efficient in their regular duties they were not efficient in the proper handling of a revolver. He advised the commission that in his opinion a class of instruction should be started at once. The other members acquiesced and appointed the mayor as official instructor and supervisor of the class.

Discussing the matter with the Free Press to-day the mayor declared that the practice will be no ordinary, everyday affair. The men will be put through a proper series of target practice and will be made as efficient as possible in hitting what the mayor terms a "surprise target."

The men will be preserved and will be submitted to the police commission each month and the standing of each member will be officially recorded. The mayor is of the opinion that some form of practice is absolutely essential. In the past the force members have often passed an entire year without once using their firearms. The mayor predicts that they will in a very short time be capable of meeting the worst thug in the country.

The commission also concurred to the request from the members of the force for an increase in pay. Mayor Brinkman, as chairman, held out against any increase. The mayor, chief and magistrate were appointed a committee to make an appointment in place of W. P. Whitehead, one of the recent appointees, who refused to accept the job of patrolman at \$100 per month.
