LITTLE BELL BIOGRAPHIE **A** Schumann

OBERT SCHUMANN, born at Zwickau, 1810, died near Bonn, 1856, was celebrated as a composer and as a critic of music. He might have become a pianist of the highest order had he not crippled the third finger of his right hand in an attempt to make it stronger and more facile by some mechanical device.
