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## GOOD QUOT TOURNAMENT

### Dartmouth Players Win Over Locals in Spirited Contest Saturday Afternoon.

Bridgetown and Dartmouth engaged in some interesting quito pitching at Bridgetown on Saturday. The members of the visiting team were W. C. Bishop, Dr. Millett, Fred Munro, Frank Martin and Councillor A. C. Pettipas. Team and individual competition were held, the visitors carrying off the honors for the day, winning four straight games in the team match and capturing the man against man events. W. C. Bishop being the winner of the final round, although Fred Little and Alfred Hiltz took second and third places respectively.

In the team competition eight players completed, four from each team. The games were of twenty-one points each and the scores were tallied facilitating the play.

## NEWSY BUDGET FROM ANNAPOLIS

### Review of Social Items of Interest.—Regrets at Death of Mr. F. St. C. Harris And Dr. C. F. Churchill.

Annapolis Royal.—Mr. and Mrs. F. C. Whitman were called to Halifax very hurriedly on Thursday by word that their son-in-law, F. St. C. Harris was critically ill. Before they reached the city however, he had passed away, and the remains were brought to his former home near Aylesford, on Saturday for interment. The late Mr. Harris was one of the best known of the younger men in the Royal Bank of Canada, and although only forty-five years old, had held the office of supervisor for the Maritime branches and Newfoundland, for several years. He was manager of the local branch about twenty years ago, and since then had been located at Bridgewater, Antigonish, Vancouver and Halifax, succeeding Mr. A. D. MacRae as supervisor in 1919. For two years Mr. Harris had suffered from a complication of diseases, having had to undergo three operations, and last winter he spent in the South. Arrangements were being completed for him to spend the coming winter in Annapolis Royal, when word came of a sudden change for the worst. He is survived by his wife, formerly Miss Gertrude Whitman and five children, Phyllis, Florence, Charles, Beverly and Frances, also his mother, Mrs. Edwin Harris of Aylesford.

The deceased young man was only ill a week, having contracted a severe cold, which developed into pneumonia. 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## ANNUAL MEET BOARD OF TRADE

### Postponed Gathering Elects Officers And Council And Discusses Some Matters of Interest.

Bridgetown Board of Trade held its postponed annual meeting on Thursday evening with a fair attendance. President E. A. Hicks in the chair. F. H. Beattie was appointed Secretary pro-tem. The president suggested the advisability of holding monthly or semi-monthly meetings and discussed in a general way the benefits of a Board of Trade to this town. A nominating committee consisting of Messrs E. A. Hicks, C. B. Longmire and Karl Freeman was appointed and nominations were made as follows: For President, F. M. Graves, Vice-Pres., Karl Freeman, Sec.-Treas. V. A. Lloyd. The choices made were approved by the meeting. A council was also appointed of the officers and ten other members. A membership committee was appointed, also a committee to take up the question of a continuous telephone service.  
Free express delivery was also briefly discussed and it was decided to have quarterly meetings of the Board, the Board Council attending to other matters in the interim. Referring President Hicks had previously expressed the opinion that it would be better to have more frequent meetings of the whole Board as in this way a greater interest would be created than having too much left to a Council within the Board. The Council method which has prevailed if the past seemed most acceptable to the meeting and was adopted. This may be the best way to create and maintain interest in the affairs of the Board but it is decidedly open to question.

## OFFICERS MADE SEARCH FOR HOME BREWED BEER.

Very recently a complaint was made to the Excise Department at Ottawa, by a resident of the county to the effect that the making of beer was very prevalent in Belleisle.  
Acting on the instructions the department despatched an officer from Halifax who accompanied by Chief Bishop made a tour and visited some five or six houses. Beer was found in some three or four of them from which samples were taken for analysis and the rest spilled.  
There has been no evidence to show of any traffic in beer. The householders made it for their own use but had neglected to apply for a government permit.
