How to Keep Butter.

Mrs. Isaac Cosler of Galton, Ill., dropped a tightly-covered pail containing seven pounds of butter into her well over fourteen years ago, which, of course, found a resting-place at the bottom, a distance of forty-one feet. Monday, while the well was being repaired, it was pumped dry, and the workmen brought up the long-lost pail of butter. On opening it it was found to be as pure and sweet as when it was made, and Mrs. Cosler will vouch for the truthfulness of the statement.—*Exchange.*

In excavating for the foundations of buildings at Boto'ph Wharf, at the depth of 20 feet below the surface, one of the shore piles of the first London Bridge has been dug up. According to Stowe, the bridge was built in the time of William the Conqueror. There is reason to believe from the grain of the wood and position of the centre of the rings that the pile was oblong in section. The fibre of the wood appears saturated and blackened with 800 years' in Thames water and mud, but perfectly sound and fit to be used as a trustworthy prop for another eight centuries.

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
