government, the matter is exercising the minds of the returned men, because these 3,000 farms are allocated to other men and they cannot find farms for themselves. Let me suggest that all the returned men should be satisfied, so far as their demands for farms are concerned, before consideration is given to others. Can we be sure that these returned men, who still ask for farms and are entitled to them, will be given consideration and their wants supplied first?

Mr. FORKE: I might say my hon. friend's wishes will be met as far as possible. Of course, they have delayed a long time. If they had taken action two years ago they would have been in a different position. The farms were vacant and some of the lands have been sold for taxes. Something had to be done. The three thousand-family scheme has been criticized and we thought better to place men on the farms which were not occupied. I think the returned soldiers have been leniently dealt with on the whole. On the resale of these lands we find in some cases, the department is getting better prices for the abandoned farms than the soldiers paid for them.

Mr. GARDINER: I can quite understand that where the conditions are improving. In some cases the returned man has held on because of price conditions, and I commend him for his judgment, but that does not solve the problem. I hope the minister will give full consideration to the demands of these men so that they will be satisfied.

Mr. SPEAKER: I have also considered that matter and have recommended that for two or three days after the session members shall be able to secure the services of stenographers and that they shall also have access to blue books and parliamentary documents.

Mr. WARD: I have heard that the Post Office Department has been instructed not to carry our files, books and other matter that we wish to send home by mail, but that they would have to be parcelled together and sent by express.

An hon. MEMBER: Too bad.
