ANSWERS TO QUESTIONS

The following answers, deposited with the Clerk of the house, are printed in the official report of debates pursuant to standing order 39:

WORK PERMITS TO FOREIGN NATIONALS

Question No. 72-Mr. Argue:

1. How many work permits have been issued to (a) American citizens; (b) other foreign nationals, for each year since 1955, and for what provinces were they effective?

2. How many (a) American citizens; (b) other foreign nationals are presently in Canada on a work permit, in what provinces and in industries or services are they working?

Answer by: Hon. Ellen L. Fairclough (Minister of Citizenship and Immigration):

1. No "work permits" as such are issued to foreign nationals seeking temporary entry to Canada for employment. They are either admitted for employment or other designated purpose or are refused entry. There may be a great number of categories of persons admitted to Canada "for employment" including diplomatic and consular representatives, foreign armed forces, members of religious orders, professional entertainers and athletes, seasonal workers, professional practitioners (doctors, lawyers, etc.), businessmen, trade representatives, executive and technical personnel of foreign concerns with Canadian interests, persons entering to service foreign built machines and systems, representatives of international trade unions and persons entering to perform labour or service for which Canadian labour is not available.

Statistics showing the number of persons who entered Canada for employment of one kind or another are available for 1959 and 1960 but cover only persons admitted from countries other than the United States. Under section 7(1)(h) of the Immigration Act, which provides for the temporary admission of "persons engaged in a legitimate profession, trade or occupation entering Canada for the temporary exercise of their respective callings" 6,733 persons entered from countries other than the United States in 1959. In 1960 these totalled 7,277. Documentation for all temporary entrants from the United States has been reduced to a minimum and does not facilitate statistical analysis.

2. Toward the end of 1960 the immigration branch instituted new procedures to document the admission of non-immigrants. An analysis of the resulting information shows that, as of March 1, 1961, a total of 1,067 persons, who entered under 7(1)(h) of the Immigration Act were in Canada. Statistics regarding the occupations of the persons are not available; however, the table below

provides a breakdown by province of residence and shows the numbers who entered from the United States and those who entered from other countries:
