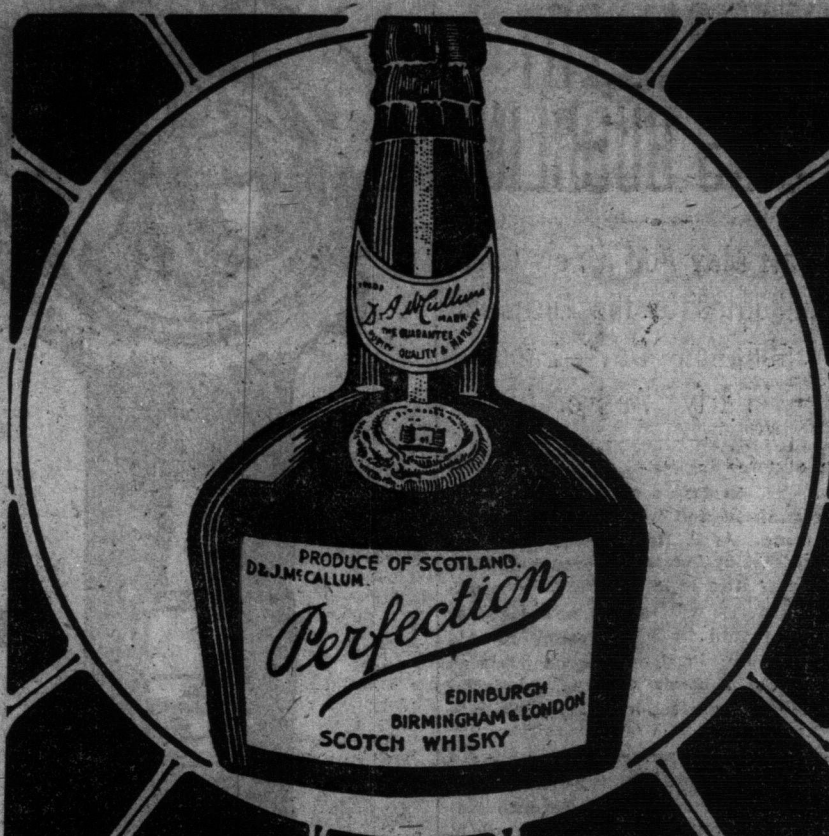

MAINSHEET \$15,000
AT THE OLD GLORY SALE

Twelve Year Old Harness Horse
With a Record of 2:35 Brings
Top Price.

NEW YORK, Nov. 29.—Mainsheet, a 12-
year-old black stallion, by Director Gen-
eral-Pixell, to-day fetched the largest
sum yet realized for a single animal in
this year's Old Glory Horse Sale at Mad-
ison Square Garden, and Cobb Bros. of
Wellsville, N.Y., bid him in for \$15,000. He
has a record of 2:36 and is a sire of note.
Probably the greatest interest of the
day centred in the sale of the 3-year-old
Ed. Custer, which as a 2-year-old forced
The Abbe to do 2:10 1/4, a world's record,
to defeat him and Custer's get. The stall-
ion is by Baremore-Marble. He was
bought by Steiner Bros. of Lima, O., for
\$8800. Of Ed. Custer's family, Orphant
Annie, a 2-year-old filly, brought the
highest price, going to B. O. Shank of
North Randall, O., for \$1000. The average
price paid for the Custer stock was \$600
a head.

Cobb Bros. were considered by horsemen
to have picked up a bargain when Direct
Hall, 2044, by Direct-Bessie Hall, was
knocked down to them for \$600.
Other animals disposed of at \$100 or over

Horsemen attending the sale are still

good animals. They point out instances,
the purchases to-day of Allie Wood, a
stallion with a record of 2:10 1/4, for \$800,
and his son, Earl Wood, a 4-year-old with
a record of 2:13 1/4, for \$200.

for the proverbial song as Jovara, 2154,
which went for \$25, and will be sent back
to Austria, from where she came two
years ago.

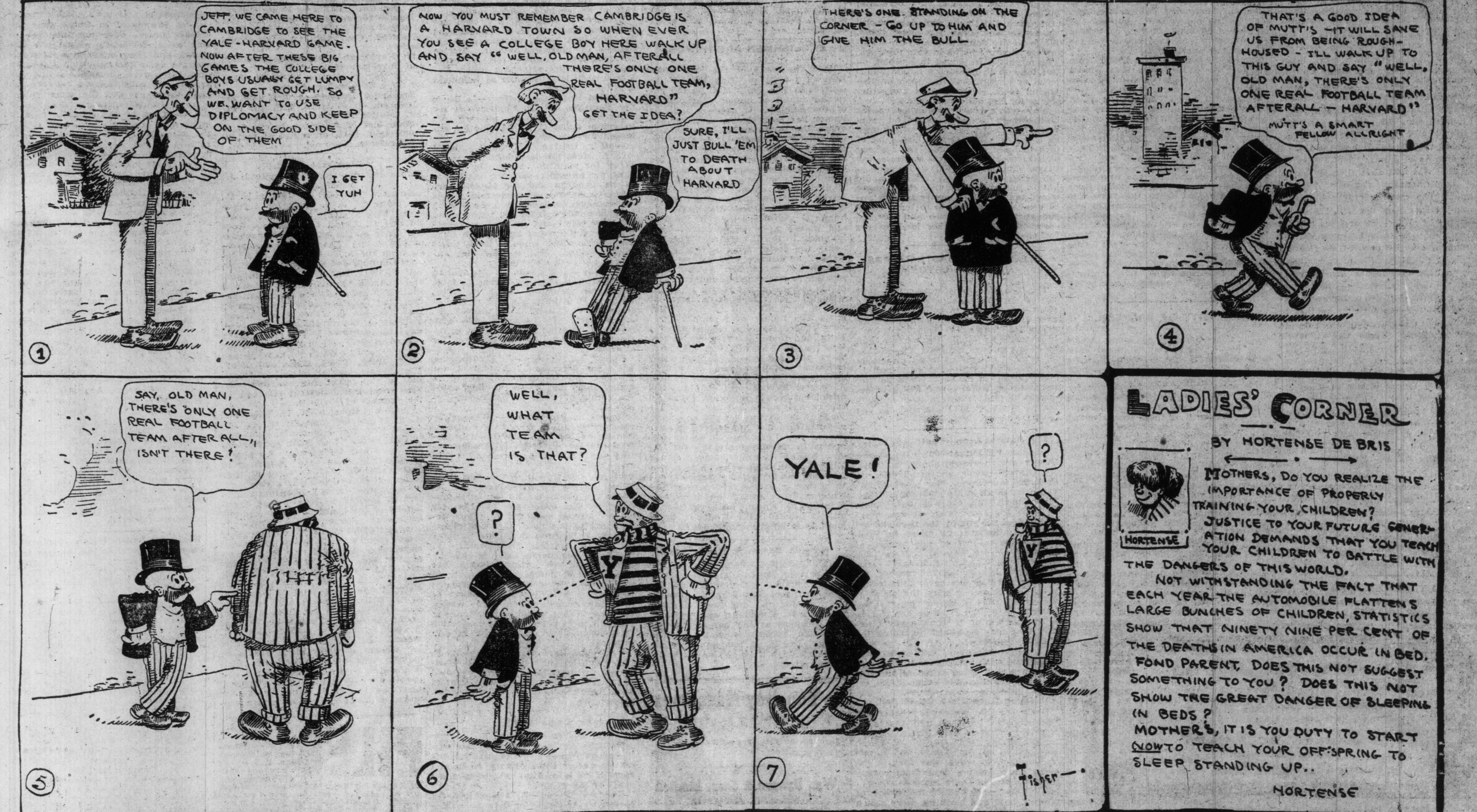
