## **BOARD CONSIDERS HOUSING PROBLEM**

Three - Storey Apartment Houses Recommended in Report.

yesterday, the board of control was not prepared to make any recommendations regarding the proposal that areas so as to permit of the erection of apartment houses of not more than three storeys. A report was presented by the city architect, assessment commissioner, finance commissioner and fire chief, the adoption of which, they thought, would relieve the scarcity of dwellings, but the controllers decided to send it along to the proper ty committee to deal with first.

In part the report said:
"In view of the housing conditions "In view of the housing conditions at present existing in the city, the question of what is termed the 'hub' population should be carefully considered, and it is thought by removing the restrictions referred to that inviting conditions to builders would result, inasmuch as the objections to apartment houses would be removed by the proposition now being submit-

"The area at present considered is that of both sides of Bloor street and Howard street on the north; of Par-Howard street on the north; of Parliament street on the east, and of Bathurst street on the west, and the harbor on the south. The building most applicable to relieve present conditions would be a three-storey apartment of not more than three suites and not exceeding twenty rooms, exclusive of bathroom, this type of building being of an economical class of construction. A building higher than thirty-five feet would come into the fireproof class, and, therefore, be much more costly. It is also proposed that old residences may be changed into apartment houses, of course within the limits aforesaid. In each case the yard area will be pro-TO HAVE LIBRARY

## FALL WHEAT SEED

IN view of the partial failure of the Fall wheat crop in this Province this year it will be necessary for farmers to make early arrangements for the supply of seed which they will need for Fall sowing. Under these circumstances farmers who have on hand quantities of wheat suitable for Fall seeding are urged to conserve them for this purpose. If there is no demand locally, the information should be supplied to this Department, or to the Local Office of this Department in your County, so that every effort may be made to have an equitable and satisfactory distribution. The need for foodstuffs justifies a large acreage of Fall wheat in this Province again this year, and the co-operation of the farmers in the mobilization and distribution of the available seed supplies is invited.
