FIGHTING LEGISLATURE OF ONTARIO OPENS PEACE SESSION

General Pau Cheered to the Echo by Enthusiastic House. SPEECH FROM THRONE Embodies Matters of Unusual Moment, Including Womanhood's Emancipation.

With as much ceremony, circumstance, and military array as if backed by the mandate of a democratic people, the legislative assembly of Ontario was formally opened at three o'clock yesterday afternoon. The floor and galleries of the legislative chamber presented a crowded and animated appearance, the members' seats being occupied by the well-dressed women folk and feminine friends of their usual occupants. Extra chairs had been introduced for the representatives of the city, the bench, the church, the educational institutions of the province, and the minor departments of government.

GERMANY WILL REPENT OF KICKING ME OUT

Statement Attributed to Ex-Kaiser in Conversation With German Foreign Minister.

London, Feb. 25.—Germany will soon repent of having overthrown the monarchy, is the statement attributed to the former German emperor by The Mail's Copenhagen correspondent, reporting a recent conversation the royal exile had with Count von Brockdorff-Rantzau, the German foreign minister.

ARMISTICE CONVENTION WILL FORM BASIS FOR PRELIMINARY TREATY

Paris, Feb. 25.—Marshal Poch, in discussing the diplomatic situation with a representative of the Havas Agency, said that the new armistice convention will provide for the naval and military disarmament of Germany. He added that there was no doubt that the supreme war council also would adopt the new agreement clauses concerning financial and territorial questions.

OTTAWA TO HAVE NO EXTRA SESSION LAURIER STATUE

Parliament Will Include Appropriation in This Year's Estimates.

WILSON WILL NOT CALL NEW CONGRESS TILL HE HAS BEEN IN EUROPE AGAIN

Washington, Feb. 25.—On the first day of his return to the capital, President Wilson put in more than ten hours at his desk, signing twenty-eight bills and joint resolutions, making a score of nominations, discussing government business for three hours with his cabinet, and winding up the day's work by a conference on the legislative situation with Democratic leader Secretary Wilson announced after an extra session of congress until after his return from Europe.

TORONTO PURCHASES METROPOLITAN RAILWAY

AGREEMENT FOR \$590,000, WHICH WAS CONCLUDED IRRESPECTIVE OF PURCHASE ACT, GIVES CITY COMPLETE OWNERSHIP, INCLUDING PERPETUAL FRANCHISE.

The city of Toronto has finally acquired that section of the Metropolitan Railway extending from Farnham avenue to stop 26, at a purchase price of \$590,000. The company, however, retains a franchise giving them the right to have packages transported over the line until the city acquires the Toronto Street Railway.

BOLSHEVIKI KILL GERMAN IN OESSEL

Paris, Feb. 25.—The German legation at Libau reports that Bolsheviki have occupied the island of Oesel and assassinated the secretary of the German legation, his wife and a courier. This announcement is made in a Havas despatch from Basle.

MacKenzie, Liberal Leader, Attacks Soldiers' Re-establishment Department. IN AGGRESSIVE SPEECH Tells Unionist-Liberals the Lamp is in the Window.

SOLDIERS WANT SPEED

The address was moved this afternoon by Major Redman of Calgary and seconded by Dr. Manson of Port William. Both gentlemen spoke exceedingly well, but neither said much in eulogy of the government.

LAMP IN THE WINDOW

Judge MacKenzie, on behalf of the opposition, made a moderate speech. He protested against the franchise as unnecessary duplication at a time when every ten cent that could be saved should be saved by the government.

HOPES FOR NEW ERA
