Supreme Council Considers Important Documents Found on Courier at Prague---Indications Are That Poland Will Secure Outlet to

Paris, March 11 .- The council of the great powers heard today a statement presented by Dr. Benes of the Czecho-Slovak delegation, on the widespreading conspiracy alleged to exist against the new state on three sides-Germany, Austro-Germany and Hungary. According to documents found on a German courier arrested at Prague, an extensive plot is being fomented to excite a revolution and furnish arms and ammunition to those seeking to overturn the new government.

The council regards the representations as serious, and is taking mea-sures to investigate and give adequate

security.

The council today also considered the serious internal conditions in Poland, which subject will be continued tomorrow when Poland's frontier in Germany will probably be determined. The indications are that Poland will secure a sea outlet northward to the Baltic, and the tendency is to include Danzig in the Polish corridor across Prussia.
