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LETTER'S HARMFUL EFFECT MAY BE HARMFUL

Robert Glocking Criticizes Circular of Secretary Young to Ontario Manufacturers.

A circular which is being sent out by Secretary Young to the Ontario members of the Manufacturers' Association, is calculated to cause a disruption between capital and labor, which sooner or later will involve the provincial legislature, and cause it to decide upon a new policy for the Ontario Bureau of Labor, or else by mandating, at force manufacturers to furnish certain information, in order that the usefulness of the bureau shall not be destroyed. At least that is the opinion of Robert Glocking, secretary of the Bureau of Labor, who has seen a copy of the circular which reads:

"Dear Sirs,—If the practice of former years is adhered to you will receive, within the next few weeks, a circular from the Ontario Bureau of Labor, asking for certain confidential information in connection with the labor conditions and the wage list in your factory.

The simple wish to call your attention to the fact that you are not obliged to give this information, and that the Ontario Bureau of Labor is not in a position to give you the incomplete returns received by the department do not tend toward correct conditions of working hours and wages.

WORTH MORE THAN THE \$100,000

Would Be Proof From Standard Oil of Its "Benefit" to Man.

New Haven, Conn., April 2.—Rev. Dr. Newman Smyth, pastor of the Centre church, to-day preached a sermon drawn from the recent discussion of the propriety of the American board of American commissioners for foreign missions accepting a gift of \$100,000 from John D. Rockefeller. Dr. Smyth said in part:
