ONE LIVED ON THE OTHER.

Now the Other Seem Destined to

Be Put Out of Business.

Jacob Pfeffermer of Ellice Township

will move to-day at Osgoode Hall for a

winding-up order against the Perth

Flax &amp; Cordage Co., capitalized at \$50,

000. He holds five shares and claims

that the liabilities are \$110,553.91, and

the assets \$29,131.74 less. During the past

year, it is said, the twine mill was run

at a loss of \$18,818.18, and the flax mill

at a loss of \$10,813.56.

It is stated in affidavit that, as the

credit of the company was not good,

raw material could not be obtained ex-

cept thru the Stratford Cordage Com-

pany, the directors of which were large-

ly the same as the directors of the

Perth Flax Company. The Stratford

Cordage Company sold the raw ma-

terial to the Perth Company at an ad-

vance of 10 per cent. The Stratford

Company also built a factory which it

leases to the Perth Company at 15 per

cent. of the investment in the build-

ing. The Stratford Cordage Company

does nothing outside supplying the raw

material to the Perth Company.

The court has already granted a

winding-up order under the Dominion

THE CORINTHIANS' HISTORY

WHOM THEY HAVE PLAYED

The Club Was Formed by N. S.

Jackson In 1882—Are the Pick

of English Footballers.

Football, the most historic and popular

game in Great Britain, has never had bet-

ter exponents than the members of the

Corinthians Club, all of whom have ex-

celled great influence for the good of the

game during the past 23 years. The Corin-

thians play here Saturday at a picked

team.

The club was founded by N. S. Jackson

in 1882. He, with a few other enthusiasts,

contended that such a combination was es-
