The Liverpool wheat market to-day falled for No. 1. to hold the strength which distinguished it last week. The cash article was off ½d, and this month's delivery closed 1½d percental lower than on Saturday. The net loss in remoter options was ¾d. Paris wheat eased off ½ to 50 centimes, with flour 15 to 60 centimes lower.

Chicago corn firmed up ¼c to-day, Liverpool maize eased off ¾d to ¾d per cental, in sympathy with wheat.

The deliveries of flour and wheat at the nine primary Western markets during the week ending Sept. 24, were, 197,875 barrels and 8,259,262 bushels, as compared with 148,739 barrels and 8,644,082 bushels in the certesponding week of last year.

The Minneapolis Market Record, an established authority on grain statistics, says that it will take 75,000,000 bushels of the new crop of wheat to reconstruct the ordinary reserves of the United States, This would make the surplus available for export this season about the same as last year.
