Fire Statistics.

Fire Chief Clark reports that there were 23 alarms turned in during the month of August. Twenty were for fires, 1 was a chimney blaze, and 1 was test run. Seven were box alarms, 14 came by telephone, and 2 were verbal. Seven proved to be grass fires and 2 were runs to the dumps. The most serious fire of the month was that which destroyed the barns of the Southwestern Traction Company. It was attended by No. 3 company only, as the barns were outside the city.

St. Thomas Times: A number of the employees of the Southwestern Traction Company met at the house of George H. Miller last evening and presented him with the following address: "Mr. George H. Miller, The true hero is one who, without hope for fee or reward, without looking for applause or thanks, quietly does what he sees to be his duty, regardless of consequences to himself. This we believe you proved yourself to be on July 2, 1907, by rescuing, at the peril of your own life, your superior officer, Mr. George Northcott, when he was caught and severely injured by the electric wires of this road." This address was artistically engrossed by Henry Roe. The address was read by Wm. Bolton, and the presentation made by George Hobbs, on behalf of the employees. Mr. Miller was completely taken by surprise, but expressed his sincere thanks.

A. O. F. MEETING AND LONDONERS

Recent Session at Berlin Was Productive of Very Much Good for the Foresters.

The delegates who have just returned from attending the high court of the A. O. F. at Galt, speak in the highest terms of the manner in which the people of Galt entertained them. The "At Home" on Wednesday evening in the town hall was of a high class and was a credit to the committee who had charge of the affair.

The business transacted by the high court will be of vital interest to the members of the A. O. F. The most sweeping change made probably was that of representation to the Subsidary High Court. Formerly the order was divided into twenty-six districts, and a representative elected from each one, but the delegates felt that the members could be brought closer together by having the delegates elected from the respective courts, and hereafter each court will elect one delegate to the high court meeting, and have a vote for each member of the court represented.

To Organize Rural Districts.

The meeting also decided to take a more active part in organizing the rural districts and places where there are no courts now. The bonus system was endorsed.

One feature noted was the executive ability displayed by the delegates. All the questions that came up for discussion were handled and discussed in a manner that would be a credit to any order.

In the election of officers the executive council who have managed the affairs so ably during the past two years, were all honored, with one exception, by being re-elected to serve for two more years. Every office was keenly contested for and London got the following honors:

credible one, and brought forth great applause.

Some side trips were taken in by the delegates, one of the most enjoyable and amusing being a trolley ride to Berlin. Most of the fun being due to Bro. Woodstock, of Toronto, and another gentleman.

The meeting altogether was productive of good legislation for the A. O. F. and a most pleasant and enjoyable outing for the delegates. The highest praise for Galt is sounded by the members who attended the convention.

Another Englishman Writes of London**Birmingham Man Liked This City**

Says Canadians Have Much to Learn in the Matter of City Roadmaking.

Mr. A. H. Powell, of the Birmingham Evening Dispatch, who recently visited London with the British journalists, in writing of Ontario and London, says:

The King's Dominion of Canada first impresses the visitor from the old country by its vastness. To one whose sense of perspective is founded on the dimensions of the United Kingdom, the scale of things here is bewildering. Since leaving Quebec I have traveled by night and by day over a thousand miles, visiting many towns by the way.

road-making. Towns have grown up with little attention to this detail, till the matter has assumed considerable urgency. Not to put too fine a point upon it, the roads are atrocious. Generally speaking, they are primitive of any foundation, and the occasional tribute of stone is engulfed as in a sea-bombardment. Here and there in the cities you will light upon an asphalted carriage way which is tolerable. More frequently, however, the attempts at road-making are primitive to a degree. When you have jolted at the imminent risk of your neck over a stretch of road, consisting of rough-hewn piles driven endwise in the mud, you begin to wonder whether the remedy is not worse than the disease. I ventured to murmur a wild expostulation to a native with whom I plunged in a motor car from peril to peril. "I guess when you make a road at home you put it there for keeps?" he inquired. I said, "I guess we do." It is satisfactory to know that some of the cities of Canada are beginning to discuss the road problem, though only in a speculative and detached way.

yet I have only seen a corner of the Province of Ontario. You are to understand that thus far I have only seen the most attractive side of Canada, and that I have seen it under the most favorable conditions. I have not had time to turn aside from the main current of Canadian life, and in order to cover as much ground as possible I have been fain to avail myself of the help of officials and public men, who have naturally with an agreeable impression of their country. I have had a swift-moving vision of a land flowing with milk and honey. My outlook has been rose-colored by a thousand courtesies daily renewed and by the kindest hospitalities.

Ontario Architecture.

In this part of Canada the material employed in building is almost as rich as the architectural design. There are frame houses constructed entirely of wood, though these are viewed with disfavour in some of the large towns as offering too ready a prey to fire. Again, there are native quarries of very fine stone, which combined with freely used concrete is being increasingly utilized, the walls being raised on a simple principle resembling in some respects the distinctive modern American construction. Brick buildings are also prominent in many places, but you will always notice that the builder cunningly invests his work with individuality, and individuality of a kind which appeals to the aesthetic sense. The Ontario home has none of the hard utilitarian aspect to which we are accustomed in our English towns.

Artisan House Owners.

Many of the artisans own their houses and take a great pride in them. This spirit is fostered by the governing authorities, and public money is freely laid out in cultivating the amenities. Unbragging boulevards, fringed with greenward, are a feature of most of the cities. In this respect, London, which lies midway between Lake Erie and Lake Huron, is entitled to the palm, though other towns and cities I have visited are little inferior. The graceful verandas give an extremely pleasing effect to the houses. The humblest cottage has its veranda. Often you may peep through a screen of flowers and foliage, and catch a glimpse of a hammock swinging in the cool recesses within. Hammocks are also slung in the surrounding trees, offering a delicious "invitation to repose." The dwellers in these pleasant places do not seem to be great gardeners. They are generally content with a grass plot and a few climbing plants, the classic "Jackmanii," or some other profuse bloomer about their walls. One misses the scent of the English rose.

Pointer for Canadians.

I have not found that town planning is practiced on quite the systematic lines that Councilor Nettelford and his friends advocate, but a sensible and beneficent control is exercised by the responsible bodies in regard to the development of urban centers. There is one thing the Canadians have yet to learn, however, and that is the art of
