

SUPPLIES MEANT FOR THREE YEARS

But Windlass Broke and the Arctic Put Back.

SUPPLIES CAREFULLY CHECKED

Experts Say in Outfitting of Bernier's Polar Expedition There Was No Extravagance.

Ottawa, June 5. — Col. Gourdeau, deputy minister of marine, was called as the first witness at the Arctic inquiry today, and gave the committee an outline of the reasons that prompted the dispatch of the Arctic. Major Moodie, of the Northwest Mounted Police, was in command of the expedition, with Capt. Bernier as sailing master. The ship was provided with three years' supplies of victuals and clothing. As to the supplies purchased for the Arctic, Mr. Gourdeau, assistant accountant of the marine department, was sent to Quebec to certify to the delivery of the goods to the Arctic, and to the quantity and quality of the goods. Mr. Gourdeau was given a duplicate of the order for those supplies, and was told to see that the goods corresponded therewith.

Col. Gourdeau read to the committee a sample of the letter that had been sent along with all orders for supplies. These stipulated that all goods were to be of Canadian origin, that quantities were to be marked on the outside of the packages. The prices to be allowed were to be the usual market rates. All goods were to be subject to departmental inspection, and when not first-class in quality, would be returned.

Continuing, Col. Gourdeau explained that when the Arctic returned in October last an inventory was made of the supplies that remained on board her. The crew of the Arctic was engaged for three years, and the department's object at the time was to equip the boat for a three years' sojourn in the north.

"Then," asked Mr. Carvell, M.P., who was conducting the examination, "why did she come back at the end of one year, instead of remaining for three?"

"This was caused," answered the colored, "by the disabling of her windlass. Another reason was that the department had decided it was better to have our patrols done in the summer, and have vessels return each year in the fall."

"Practically, then," remarked Mr. Carvell, "you decided upon a change of your former policy?"

Col. Gourdeau—Yes. Proceeding, Col. Gourdeau explained that it had been arranged when the Arctic went north that the steamer Neptune should meet her with coal and fresh supplies at Cape Mastenholm. But, as a matter of fact, the Neptune was delayed in sailing, through the loss of one of the Hudson's Bay Company's vessels. There was danger that this might expose the company's posts in Hudson's Bay to privations, so as to avoid this possibility the Neptune was held until she loaded with supplies for the Hudson's Bay Company. In the meantime, the Arctic, with her damaged windlass, reached Chateau Bay, on the Gulf of St. Lawrence.

At the request of the committee Col. Gourdeau read a certificate from the engineers of the Arctic, and of the sealer Diana, that the windlass of the Arctic was so damaged that in its present state it would be very unsafe for the vessel to go on.

Capt. Bernier, on his part, would not undertake to remain in the north with the broken windlass, which was especially risky by reason of the number of times she would have to anchor.

Mr. Bergeron called attention to a clause in the instructions issued to Major Moodie, which stipulated that the stores on the Arctic were to be issued by himself on requisition from the sailing master, but he (Major Moodie) was to be held responsible.

"Were these instructions carried out?" asked Mr. Bergeron.

think they were carried out to the letter."

Mr. Northrup asked whether the department, when ordering supplies, made inquiries as to prices.

The witness answered that the orders stipulated for the delivery of goods at wholesale market prices.

"Were all the purchases made from wholesale firms?" asked Mr. Northrup. "As many as we could," answered the witness.

"Who told you the quantities that would be required for the trip?"

"Capt. Bernier prepared a list of the articles he wanted," answered Col. Gourdeau.

The witness went on to say that he had looked over the list with Capt. Bernier, and with some exceptions the list was approved. Orders for the goods were then sent out under instructions from the minister.

The supplies purchased were more than was actually required for the three years' cruise of the Arctic. There was a certain amount over and above that, so that the Arctic would be able to land stores for the mounted police posts.

Capt. Spain, commander of the Canadian fisheries protective service, was then called. He corroborated what Col. Gourdeau had said about his having gone over Captain Bernier's list of supplies along with Col. Gourdeau, and, as far as he remembered, it had been accepted practically without amendment. Asked with regard to the purchase of champagne for the Arctic, Captain Spain said that at first he had objected to this, but that Dr. Flood, the ship's physician, had insisted on its being absolutely necessary. He figured that the supplies would last 40 men for 1,200 days. Captain Spain was closely questioned as to the different kind of supplies ordered. He thought that ten-cent cigars might be regarded as a little extravagant. There was not too much tobacco. The British navy would issue a larger supply of such articles. The quantity of 1,200 gallons of lime juice was not excessive. It was three-quarters of a gallon per month for each man. Neither did he regard the outlay of \$22,000 for clothes or \$55,000 for food as being excessive, in view of the conditions under which the voyage was to be made.

Col. Fred White, comptroller of the Northwest Mounted Police, was the next witness. After reviewing the reasons that prompted the dispatch of the expedition, Col. White declared any supplies shipped by the Arctic to the Mounted Police posts in Hudson's Bay were paid for by the marine department. He did not consider that in the aggregate the purchases were extravagant.

\$65,000 FROM CANFIELD

Famous Gambling Trial of New York Comes to an End.

New York, June 5. — With a verdict for \$65,000, the full amount claimed, the suit of John Delahanty against Richard A. Canfield for legal services growing out of the raid on the latter's gambling house by District Attorney Jerome in February, 1904, was brought to an end today.

From the gross amount is to be deducted \$5,000 which Delahanty received in cash and \$1,500 due Canfield for money borrowed by Delahanty, leaving the net amount of the award \$45,500. Permission was given to appeal for a new trial within 60 days.

Neither Canfield nor Delahanty was in court when the jury, after deliberating for an hour and a half, returned its verdict. Delahanty was called in rebuttal when the trial was resumed this morning, and denied that he advised Canfield on the night of the raid that he need not remove the gambling apparatus stored in the fourth floor of the house.

The rest of the day was devoted to summing up by counsel, who exchanged bitter accusations of misrepresentation and perjury, and a brief charge by Judge Newburger.

TO SAVE THE FALLS

Measure for Control and Regulation Passes Congress.

Washington, June 5. — The bill for the control and regulation of the Niagara River and the preservation of Niagara Falls was passed by the House under suspension of the rules.

It provides for regulating the diversion of water from Niagara River or its tributaries in the State of New York under constitutional authority, for protecting the navigability of streams, and for national defense.

The bill authorizes, first, the issuance of permits to individuals, companies, or corporations already using water authorizing its diversion to the extent to which it is now being used; second, the issuance of further permits both for diversion of water on the American side and for the transmission of electricity created by water power from the Canadian side, this, however, in all cases, with the limitation that such permits shall not impair the scenic grandeur of Niagara Falls, the navigability of the river, or its integrity as a boundary stream.

Permits are to be issued by the secretary of war, and the quantity of electrical power which may, by permits, be allowed to be transmitted from the Dominion of Canada into the United States shall be 150,000 horsepower. The further provision is made that the secretary may issue revocable permits for the transmission of additional power so generated in Canada, but in no case shall the amount authorized in the permits together with the said 150,000 horsepower and the amount generated and used in Canada, exceed 350,000 horsepower. The act is to remain in force for three years, and \$50,000 is appropriated for its administration.

IRISH GIVE UP POLITICAL WAR

Hopes Now Center on Industrial Revival.

PROSPERITY FOR GALWAY

Movement to Restore Old Conditions Promising—Significant Talk by Bishop.

Dublin, June 5. — Political as well as commercial changes are visible to any man who desires to see. While the people are still anxious to have the laws of the country administered by Irishmen, there is an undercurrent of feeling that the industrial potentialities of Ireland have been sacrificed to the glorification of political heroes who waste their time, money, and energy in doing—nothing for Ireland.

The Bishop of Galway has thrown in his influence with the industrial revival. "I regard this industrial movement," he says, "as the most immediately pressing form of home rule. The keeping of our people and our money at home is of paramount importance in the crisis through which we are now passing."

There is still hope for Galway from a commercial standpoint. At one time it was a connecting link with the United States and many of the men whose names are written indelibly on America's history made it the port of their departure. Irishmen do not want it to be any longer regarded as a mere emigration center. What they are trying to do is to revive its commercial greatness and place it again among the prominent industrial cities of the Empire.

A couple of years ago Mr. Zimmerman, father-in-law of the Duke of Manchester, appeared to interest himself in the port. It was reported that he was in communication with the Canadian Pacific Railway with the view of establishing a line of steamboats between Galway and Montreal, but the scheme, for some reason or other, has not come to anything. With the cooperation of Mrs. Shawe-Taylor, Father Travers, a local priest, has established a Galway branch of the Irish Industrial Development Association, and already all who are commercially sold in the city of the tribes have become members.

The first parish in Ireland to free itself of landlordism is Partry in the county of Mayo. Here the Rev. James Corbett, uncle of Gentleman Jim, America's celebrated pugilist, has been for years endeavoring to secure for his parishioners the plots of land on which they toil and try to live.

Three hundred acres have now been fairly divided among the tenants under the land act and Father Corbett is enthusiastic over the prospect of the new era bringing forth for Mount Partry.

The Irish sheep trade is threatened with serious loss owing to certain regulations which the English agricultural board have drawn up. From August 1 to the middle of November no Irish sheep will be allowed to enter any market or saleyard in Scotland, Wales or the north of England unless accompanied by a declaration made by the owner that they had been "dipped" within a month previously. From this requirement even lambs, which are frequently killed by premature dipping, are not exempt.

The new order means that the exporters, who at present collect their consignments at various fairs throughout Ireland, can only purchase in future from such owners as come to the fairs armed with dipping declarations. And here comes in what will cause trouble to the small sheep owner. There are no dipping facilities in the country. Dipping tanks generally cost over \$500 each and that is merely the initial outlay. Within the next twelve months, the majority of the petty sheep owners will be forced to adopt the less enterprising alternative of giving up sheep rearing altogether. One of the worst features of this new strangling regulation is that it has been framed and put into operation without a single protest from the Irish department of agriculture.

When Richard Croker came to live in Ireland it was thought that Glencairn, the house which he bought on the outskirts of Dublin, was quite fine enough for a man of his supposed social and democratic tastes. But by bit he pulled the old mansion asunder until now a magnificent pile of Irish granite boasting some architectural attractions indicates the spot where. The former boss of Tammany proposes to spend the rest of his days and incidentally much of the money whose acquisition once formed the subject of a legislative investigation in New York. All the stone has been supplied from his own quarry, and in the scheme of furnishing and decorating Irish materials have been used throughout. As many as a hundred men are at present employed in putting the finishing touches on the new habitation, and when the whole is completed there will be a grand opening scene, where many of Mr. Croker's Irish and American friends will be invited to share his hospitality.

The invitation to Lord Aberdeen to open the Connaught-Munster Exhibition in July is causing some indignation among certain Irishmen in Limerick, who still adhere to the policy of antagonism. The City of the Broken Treaty has always had a reputation for being the center of revolutionary propaganda. It elected John Dwyer, one of the dynamite prisoners, its mayor, and would have sent him to Parliament if he showed any ambition to become a constitutional legislator. Opinions have changed since those days, and now there is a feeling among the business classes especially that the patron-

age of the Irish lord lieutenant is of more value to the commercial activities of Limerick than the ideals for which John Dwyer suffered. The promoters of the international exhibition, which will be opened in Ireland next year, are endeavoring to secure the services of the King for the occasion.

ANOTHER EMPRESS OUT

C. P. R.'s Fine New Liner Will Have Speed Trials This Week.

London, June 5. — The Empress of Ireland, the other new C. P. R. boat, makes trial trips this week. "Let the empire be self-sustaining," said Mr. Chamberlain addressing some friends at Birmingham. He again urged closer commercial relations. At the last election they were fighting for an imperial council, imperial defense, an imperial navy, and an imperial army—all for the peace and prosperity of those who come after. Patrick Gray, a member of the executive on free importation of Canadian cattle, in a letter says the recent disclosures emphasize the need to remove the embargo that farmers may be able to obtain raw material to increase the supply of home-fed butchers' meat in sufficient quantity to take the place of imported canned meats.
