CRITICS DO NOT LIKE YANKEE STYLE

Britishers Say Much Rowing Power Is Wasted by Harvard.

Bourne End, Eng., Aug. 18.—The Harvard and Cambridge crews showed good form in their practice rows this morning. The Cambridge men were out first, and rowed from Marlow Point to Bourne End, two miles, 560 yards, in eleven minutes fifty-eight seconds. A strong cross wind was blowing at the time, and several of the oarsmen were distressed at the finish.

The Harvard crew paddled to Marlow Point by easy stages, and, turning, alternately rowed and paddled over the full three-and-a-quarter-mile course to Cookham, stroking 29 to 30 to the minute. Their time to the Bourne End railway bridge was 12 minutes, 26 seconds, and to Cookham 18 minutes, 10 seconds. In the trials for the last inter-varsity race the Cambridge crew rowed to the same points in respectively 10 minutes 54 seconds, and 16 minutes 7 seconds.

The rowing methods of the Americans are the subject of much interesting criticism among the British experts. It has been said they cannot row in rough water, but in the few instances at their racing, pace they have cleared the water well, with a high feather which occasioned little splashing.

Mr. Muttibury, one of the most expert of the English coaches, thinks the American mode of dipping the oars a disadvantage to them, and considers the English method of chopping the water superior. He contends that the blade, being put in at an angle, so slices the water that it loses more power than if it were put in in an upright position. Several expert English oarsmen share this opinion.

Guy Nickalls, a well-known oarsman, adversely criticises the stretchers used in the Harvard boat. He considers that the angle at which they are placed does not allow the men to get the full strength of their legs, which throws too much work on their arms.
