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## PROMINENT LIBERAL DIES AT WINNIPEG

WINNIPEG, Feb. 19.—John J. Molloy died here last night at the age of 61 years after a lingering illness. He was born at Quebec, Ont., in 1837, came west in 1872 as resident engineer of the Canadian Pacific construction, of which was then just started. Mr. Molloy represented Provencher as a Liberal in the Provincial House for some years. One of his sons is Dr. J. P. Molloy, M.P.

## BLAMES PACIFISTS FOR AWFUL CONFLICT RAGING IN EUROPE

Too Much Peace.

"We have advertised to the world that we did not want to fight and we advocated peace. We have brought up our children under a delusion of peace. If we had been true to the opportunities presented to us as British subjects, the war would not have taken place. We let the Germans believe that Canada, South Africa, Ireland, India and Australia would not share the danger of the mother country if need arose. This was advertising our sins."

The world was destined to suffer repetitions of this war until the people here learned that they were not citizens of this or that party, but of the world, and that their safety depended on their use of the pole, and until they wiped out their provincialism, he added.

Have No Right.

"If you want to live and do as you would be done by you should see that no one section of the community suffers because of the introduction of the whole people. You have no right to use the full force of the country to put men out of business who have paid their taxes as citizens for years, unless you compensate them. If you were alive to moral values, you would not talk of a bylaw to put the coal dealers out of business without compensation."

It was the same with regard to the hydro-electric. While he had a great admiration for Sir Adam Beck, and believed that he was the forerunner of socialism—for he had established a precedent, the trend of which was to the time when food, clothing and other necessities would be available, as is

hydro-electric—yet, he asked, was it right that the province should put people who had been in the electrical business for years out of business, without compensation. The speaker was ashamed of his province in this respect.

Made No Provision.

## FINNISH WHITE GUARDS CORNERED BY REDS IN BOTHNIA GULF REGION
