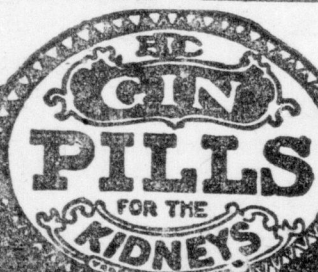

CANADA CALLED TO SEND 50,000 MORE MEN OVER

This Number Now Doing Home Defense Duty Will Be Forwarded.

HAVE TO BE REPLACED

Appeal for Volunteers to Fill Up the Old Militia Regiments.

OTTAWA, March 16.—Fifty thousand more Canadian soldiers will cross the Atlantic this summer if a plan adopted by the Dominion Government proves successful. There are fifty thousand trained men in Canada, who are held for home defence, to meet any raid of men who might be organized so secretly as to escape the attention of authorities cross the line and operate in Canada, if the land were undefended. American troops could not pursue them across the border.

Volunteers are now called for to fill up the old militia regiments, which have almost disappeared since war began. Fifty thousand men are wanted for home defence and to replace the trained 50,000 men now in France. Age and physical standards are the same for home as overseas service, same pay, for privates, \$1.10, less separation allowance. It is figured that the home pay is 10 cents a day less than overseas.

Under War Measures Act. Service for each continues to be voluntary with the option of choice. Training will be created to decide whether a man may join or be refused as more useful in industrial life. Home uniform will be the same as overseas, but there will be a distinctive badge for overseas men. Service is for the period of the war. The plan is not under the militia act, but by authority of a special order in council under the war measures act. The Government has issued a statement and appeals for volunteers under the new scheme.

The Statement Follows. "Of the troops which have volunteered for service overseas there still remain in Canada approximately 25,000. It is necessary that the country should not be left without an adequate force for home defence in case of emergency. The prime minister, who has recently visited the front states that:

"We are entering upon the most critical period of the war." "It is not only the desire of the men who have already enlisted and who are still in Canada, but it is also the desire of the men overseas, as well as of their British comrades-in-arms and of the Imperial Government, that we should send overseas with as little delay as possible the troops now in Canada which have enlisted for overseas service. These men have been warned and are making ready to depart from Canada for the scenes of active warfare."

"Canada has every reason to be proud of her sons who have taken such a noble part in winning the war, and their deeds of valor have been recorded time and again. And now, when the British Empire is struggling to maintain its existence and secure liberty and justice for the world, it is Canada's duty to do still more."

Appeal to Manhood. "In order that the 50,000 troops of the Canadian expeditionary force at present serving in Canada may be replaced for active warfare, an appeal is now made to the manhood of Canada for an equal number of men to volunteer for home defence by joining the active militia. An opportunity is therefore now afforded to those who have been prevented from undertaking overseas service, and to intrust the whole task of home defence to this historic force, which never yet has failed to rally to the service of our country. A tribute must be paid to the admirable work done by the existing units of this force and kindred associations in recruiting the Canadian expeditionary force, which has largely been accomplished through its aid.

"It is to be clearly understood that the enlistment of the above-mentioned force for home defence is not intended in any way to lessen the strongest possible effort for recruiting for active service overseas; the necessity of which at this critical stage of the war cannot be too strongly urged."

Troops to Mobilize. "The troops to be mobilized will consist of infantry and field artillery, with a due proportion of supply and transport, medical and other administrative services."

"Men who enlist for overseas service in the C. E. F. will be formed into companies, etc., and attached for training to the home defence units until required for overseas service."

"During March battalion staffs will be organized, officers and non-commissioned officers will undergo instruction, and recruits will be enrolled."

"During April men enlisted for home defence will train two evenings and one afternoon a week. Men enlisted for the C. E. F. will, of course, train full time."

"During May, both units, unless detailed for special duty, will go into camp and stay there during the summer."

From 18 to 45. "Men between the ages of 18 and 45 and who are medically fit for active service are urged to enlist. They will enlist for one year or during the term of the war should it last longer, and for six months after the war, provided his majesty should so long require their services."

Men enlisted for home defence will be provided with clothing and necessities on an adequate scale. Men who enlist for the C. E. F. will be furnished with some distinguished badge.

"Pay for the officers, non-commissioned officers and men, will be the same as that prescribed for active militia called out for active service. There will, however, in addition be a separation allowance of \$15 per month for married men, and a proportionate allowance for officers and N. C. O.'s graded according to rank."

"There has been created for the duration of the war with a view to assisting the militia council in the special work of mobilizing the active militia, an additional directorate in the branch of the chief of the general staff. This directorate will be under Major-General S. C. Newburn, director of the Canadian defence force, an officer who is well-known throughout Canada, and who has performed splendid service since the beginning of the war, and who has occupied the position of assistant adjutant-general in charge of administration, Military District No. 2. Sir Robert's Appeal.

"Special attention is directed to the appeal of the prime minister, who has just returned to England from the front, and who emphasizes the importance of

"London, March 15. 'Minister of Militia and Defence, Ottawa, Ont.:

"Upon my visit to the Canadian divisions in France, from which I have just returned, I found their spirit, their physique and their training all that could be desired. Having traversed some of the ground won from the enemy during recent months, I was very proud to know that at Courcellette and elsewhere our troops distinguished themselves by a courage, dash and determination which evoked the highest admiration. Including railway construction and forestry battalions, the value of whose services cannot be over-estimated, Canada now has one hundred and thirty thousand men in France."

"We are entering upon the most critical period of the war, and I voice the feeling at the front when I appeal to Canadians to support with the most earnest effort the proposals which you are putting forward to partially mobilize the active militia of Canada. A splendid response to these proposals is vitally necessary to that final strength of our Dominion, in co-operation with the whole Empire, shall be thrown into the struggle with the least possible delay. RUSSIA WAS NEAR A SEPARATE PEACE THROUGH STURMER

Prof. Milukoff Saved Entente From Dangerous Intrigue.

LONDON, March 16.—Henry M. Hyndman, Socialist leader in England, commenting on the Russian revolution, said:

"There is no harm in saying now what has long been known in official circles; namely, that Russia was on the verge of making a separate peace with Germany last autumn through Premier Sturmer. The action of Professor Milukoff in the Duma forced the resignation of Mr. Sturmer and saved the Entente from the most dangerous intrigue since the beginning of the war. But the intrigue was only scotched, and we were on the eve of another movement of the same kind through Protopopoff, the deposed minister of the interior, when Professor Milukoff and others in the Duma again saved the situation, this time by the bold step of revolution."

"I do not think the danger is entirely over even now. The Russian bureaucracy is a powerful and insidious lobby of the Duma, Deputy Kerenski, the new Russian minister of justice, says a Reuter dispatch from Petrograd dated today, announced that the provisional government took office by virtue of an agreement with workmen and soldiers' delegates. The council of these delegates approved the agreement by several hundred votes to 15. The first act of the new government, M. Kerenski declared, has been the immediate publication of a decree of full amnesty. Continuing, the dispatch adds, the minister of justice said:

"Our comrades of the second and fourth Duma, who were banished illegally to the tundras of Siberia will be released forthwith."

"In my jurisdiction are all the pre-miers and ministers of the old regime. They will answer before the law of all crimes against the people."

"Show them no mercy," many voices in the crowd are reported to have exclaimed.

SS. GEORGETOWN FOUNDERED. New York, March 16.—The arrival here today of the captain and fifteen members of the crew of the French freight steamer Georgetown disclosed that the vessel, founded at sea on February 27, when about seven hundred miles east of New York on her voyage toward Havre, France. The entire crew of 24 officers and men were rescued, and those who did not reach here today on the French Line freighter La Perouse from Havre, were taken into Halifax on the British tank ship Strombus, after being transferred on March 8, from La Perouse.

"LONG LIVE FREE RUSSIA!" CRIES JUSTICE MINISTER, SHAMEFUL METHODS BANNED

Banished Members of Second and Fourth Dumas Will Be Restored, and Ministers of Regime Just Ousted "Will Answer for All Crimes Against People."

LONDON, March 16.—Addressing an assemblage of thousands of soldiers and civilians from the gallery of the lobby of the Duma, Deputy Kerenski, the new Russian minister of justice, says a Reuter dispatch from Petrograd dated today, announced that the provisional government took office by virtue of an agreement with workmen and soldiers' delegates. The council of these delegates approved the agreement by several hundred votes to 15. The first act of the new government, M. Kerenski declared, has been the immediate publication of a decree of full amnesty. Continuing, the dispatch adds, the minister of justice said:

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More Canuck Drafts Arrive in England

OTTAWA, March 16.—It is officially announced through the chief press censor's office, that the following troops have arrived safely in England:

Balance of the 230th Forestry Battalion; No. 1 section, skilled railway employees, Montreal; drafts for heavy and garrison and field artillery, medical corps, draft infantry French-Canadians. Railway construction personnel.

"Comrades," added M. Kerenski, "regenerated Russia will not have recourse to the shameful methods utilized by the old regime. Without trial, none will be condemned. All prisoners will be tried in open court."

"Long Live Free Russia." "Comrades! Soldiers! Citizens! All measures taken by the new government will be published. Soldiers! I ask you to co-operate. Free Russia is now born, and none will succeed in wresting liberty from the hands of the people. Do not listen to the promptings of the agents of the old regime. Listen to your officers. Long live free Russia!"

Lionize Labor Leader. The labor leader, Chkheidze, addressing officers and soldiers, paid a glowing tribute to the soldiers and workmen who had participated in accomplishing the revolution. He recounted the dispatch says, the recent provocative efforts by the secret police in publishing proclamations regarding the murders of officers. He exhorted the soldiers to regard their officers as citizens who had helped raise the revolutionary flag and as brothers in the great cause of Russian liberty. Subsequently officers, soldiers and workmen carried M. Chkheidze on their shoulders through a cheering throng of soldiers and civilians.
