is a list of articles sent: 263 pans socks, 14 shirts, 12 pyjamas, 12 trench suits, 1 trench cap, 8 scarfs, 2 ties, 36 M. T. bandages, 17 T. bandages, 7 triangular bandages, 1 roll gauze, 2 hot water bottle covers, 2 bundles old linen. The ladies meet every Wednesday in the public library rooms or in the council chamber to work on the articles, which cannot be taken home. They also distribute yarn, shirts, etc., to those who are willing and have time to make up the goods.
