LORD CECIL GIVES TALK

Does Not Believe Armistice Proposal Represents Real Russian Opinion.

AMSTERDAM, Nov. 23 .- A dispatch to the Frankfurter Zeltung from Vienna says reports received from Tarnopol are to the effect that, Russian troops are preparing to evacuate the East Galician towns of Gmaymadoff and Skalat, near the Russian border. The dispatch adds that the advanced position already have been voluntarily evacuated.

BREACH OF TREATY,
LONDON, Nov. 23.—Lord Robert
Cecil, minister of blockade, in his
weekly talk with the Associated Press,
spoke of the proclamation issued by
Nokolai Lenine and his followers in
Russia, urging an immediate armistice,
contimulae: continuing:

"If it represents the real opinion of the Russian people, which I do not believe it does, it would be a direct breach of treaty obligations and Russia's alliance. Such an action, if approved and ratified by the Russian nation, would put tnem virtually outside the pale of civilized Europe.

"But I do not believe for a moment."

Russian people will approve or con-Lord Robert Cecil continued, "that the Russian people will approve or confirm this action. I do not want to indulge in any personal abuse, but if you will examine the Leninite proclamation-carefully you will find it is a direct incitement by men who profess to be the government, to the soldiers to arrest their generals, and open all along the line peace negotiations across the trenches.

trenches.

Steps to Destroy Army.

"If the object of the Leninites primarily had been to destroy the Russian army as a fighting force, it is difficult to see what other steps could have been taken by these gentlemen in Petrograd."

Asked whether the Allies were likely to recognize the present Russian Gov.

to recognize the present Russian Gov-ernment, Lord Robert said he could not imagine such a step possible. To the question whether England had underquestion whether England had undertaken any embargo on merchandise going to Russia, Lord Robert said he did not know that any formal embargo had been undertaken, but as far as he knew nothing was going to Russia at present. Regarding the effect of the Russian situation on Rumania, Lord Robert said that any wholesale disorganization on the Russian front was bound to affect Rumania. He added a tribute to the splendid loyalty to the Allied cause which was being shown by the Rumanian Government and people.

HUN PEACE NOTE.


STOCKHOLM, Nov. 23.—According to the Tidningen, a Russian diplomat left Stockholm yesterday for Petrograd with orders to hand to the Russian revolutionary government proposals for peace by the central powers.

The Bolsheviki Government, according to a report from Haparanda, has sent representatives to meet German Socialist delegates, probably at Stockholm, to arrange an armistice and negotiate peace. It is understood that the delegates from both sides will hide their identity.

Thirty-five passengers on today's train from Petrograd crossed the frontier into Sweden. Despite the Bolsheviki peace offer, the exchange rate of the German mark continues to fall.
