Overall Uniforms for Women Workers at G. T. R. Carshops

Another Innovation Sprung at Works When Girls Appear in Them.

Farmettes in their blue jeans have nothing on the female employees of the G. T. R. carshops. Two of the ten women who are washing cars, appeared for duty Monday morning with a mysterious parcel under their arms. They emerged later from the dressing-rooms in the regulation uniform which has been adopted by women workers in war work. This caused a sensation for a few minutes, but finally everyone went about their work and forgot the fleeting vision.

"We like the work, and it is much easier to get around in these clothes than in dresses. Of course the suits seem strange at first, but we will soon become accustomed to them. Somebody had to break the ice and we decided to be the ones to do it." This said the two girls who donned overalls for the first time.

The other women of the shops are having their spare cash, and probably will follow the example and adopt the convenient uniform for work.

PASTORS LOSING RACE AGAINST COST OF LIVING

Money for Music, But Not for Increasing Ministers' Salaries.

WASTE IS SCANDALOUS

Professionalizing Church Is Not Devotion, Says Dr. Nelson.

The report of the committee on statistics and finances was read to the Presbyterian General Assembly yesterday by Dr. John Somerville. It was a short report, the secretary stating that the last year was a very difficult one for the committee, owing to the war conditions and the fact that there had been so many changes in Presbytery clerks.

He drew attention to the fact that Government returns showed that living expenses had increased 20 per cent during the past five years, yet the stipend of the ministers had not been increased accordingly by the congregations. Dr. S. Banks Nelson of Hamilton contrasted the increase of appropriations in the church for music, compared to the minister's salary. He stated that in one church he knew of the stipend had remained the same for 30 years, yet the paid soloists had been raised from time to time.

"This is scandalous waste," said Dr. Nelson, "to professionalize the church, and it is not devotion." Elder J. Rodger of Westmount objected to the term "scandalous waste."

"I submit to the change of phraseology," retorted Dr. Nelson, "amidst laughter, but the fact remains that it is a scandalous fact." Seconded by Dr. G. Bryce, the report was then adopted by the assembly with three recommendations regarding the oversight of congregations by the Presbyteries.

Rev. John Stirling of Prince Edward was submitted to the assembly, and the finance committee (eastern section) was appointed. It is a satisfactory report, and I move its adoption," which was agreed by the assembly.

The auditors report was read by Dr. John Somerville and adopted by the assembly as read. The auditors expressed satisfaction with the books, records and accounts of the treasurer of the church, Dr. John Somerville.

The trustees' report and the treasurer's report (western section) were both adopted by the assembly as published, there being no convenor present to lay these reports before the house.

This concluded the afternoon session. Business in connection with the report and inform ministers' fund report was concluded, and recommendations were adopted. In fact, she's a regular deer. MOTHERS' CLUBS ASK COUNCIL TO GRANT COLLECTORS' DEMAND

Want Garbage Collection Resumed at Once.

Action to secure resumption of the garbage collection system at once was urged on the city council in a resolution passed by the Union Mothers' Club at its annual meeting in Lord Roberts School on Monday night. The resolution, which is in the form of a petition, asks that the increase in the collectors' wages be given at once rather than have no garbage system whatever.

Interest was centred in the election of officers, and Mrs. A. B. Tutt was re-elected president by acclamation. The other officers were: 1st vice-president, Mrs. Gemmill; secretary-treasurer, Mrs. Roemer (re-elected); press reporter, Mrs. Buchner (re-elected).

The reports of the various Mothers' Clubs presented at the meeting, showed the keen interest taken in patriotic work during the past year, the articles contributed to the Red Cross from all clubs aggregating many thousands. Other phases of the clubs' activities were noted. It was pointed out that during the Child Welfare week the Union Club gave its assistance unflinchingly every day.

The school club of the city had forgotten the Children's Aid Society, each club having contributed to the upkeep of the Shelter during the year.

The treasurer's report, presented by Mrs. John Roemer, was considered an excellent one.

A. A. Lagy, registrar for the city for the man and woman power registration of June 22, explained the motive for the registration, and called for voluntary assistance from the club members for that day.

City Clerk S. B. Bar, who presided during the election of the officers, gave a short address on "Citizenship." He pointed out the progress of the "Sparrow Boys' Orchestra and solos by Ed. Webster and Miss Carey, a pupil of Miss D. Abbott, as well as readings by Mrs. Reid, were features of the evening which proved most enjoyable.

The Social Service executive was read, asking for a delegation of not more than ten members to attend a meeting to be held in the Y. M. C. A. on the 18th June, with a view to organizing the city's department in London. This Social Service executive, the convenor of which was Dr. Tucker, was asked for his purpose at the meeting called some time ago by the Ministerial Alliance, at which Dr. Shaver spoke for the meeting each woman's organization is asked to appoint representatives.
