Twelve With Death of Photographer.

CHICAGO, July 22.—Only theories as to the cause of the explosion and destruction by fire of the dirigible machine resulting in twelve deaths and injury to 28 other persons yesterday were elicited at the first session of the coroner's inquiry today.

The cause of the disaster seemed as far from disclosure as at the moment when flames spurted along the gas bag as it soared above Chicago's skyscrapers before plunging down through the roof of a great bank, spreading fatal flames among bookkeepers, clerks and stenographers preparing to end their day's work.

A grand jury investigation will be made according to information at the criminal court building today. Prosecution is certain, according to Assistant State's Attorney John M. Lowry.

The twelfth victim of the calamity was Milton G. Norton, a photographer for a morning paper who died today. He was injured in attempting a descent from the balloon with a parachute. He was a veteran newspaper man and sought the assignment to go with the dirigible on one of its early test flights.
