

NO FOUNDATION FOR REPORTED ADEQUATE

President of Windsor Gas Company Declares—Claims Windsor Is Discriminated Against.

WINDSOR, Oct. 10.—Declaring that Mayor Winters has absolutely no foundation for his repeated assurances to the people that there will be an adequate supply of gas for heating this winter, President T. P. Pinckard of the Windsor Gas Company in characteristics. winter, President T. P. Pinckard of the Windsor Gas Company, in a statement today, declared that all indications point the opposite way, and based his claim on the recent statement of Gas Commissioner Estlin of Chatham, who, after a thorough investigation has reported gas would be scarce this winter. President Pinckard said it was his opinion that large quantities of gas are now being used by industrial plants of Chatham, and that in this regard Windsor is being discriminated against by the Government. y the Government.

Victim Used Butt of Gun To Knock Down An Apple.

WEAPON DISCHARGED

Lloyd Schefter, 15, Killed Instantly-Charge Tore Hole in Chest.

GUELPH. Oct. 10 .- Tragedy followed closely in the wake of a hunting party eastern outskirts of the city. Two young men, Lloyd Schefter. aged 15, and his chum, B. Lefneskie, 17, took advantage of the fine day to go shooting, and were working their way in from Victoria road to the Dundas road. when, at the rear of the McCarfon farm, they espied an apple tree on which several apples were still hangwhich several apples were still hanging.

Schefter tried to get one about ten feet from the ground, and finding he could not reach it, took his rifle to knock it down. Unheedingly he held the weapon by the muzzle in endeavoring to dislodge the apple with the putt when either a twig caught the trigger, or the jar caused the rifle to discharge, the charge lodging in the centre of his breast, tearing a great hole therein and severing the vital organs. Schefter never spoke after the accident happened, and within two minutes he was dead.

His chum's cries for help were answered by several people who were nearby, and physicians were summoned but nothing could be done. Coroner Dr. MacKinnon was soon on hand, but it was quite clear that the tragedy was the result of an accident. The victime resided on Oliver street and is survived by his father and a number of brothers and sisters.

CANADA'S FIELD CROPS LARGER THAN IN 1919

WINNIPEG, Oct. 9.—The total field crops of Canada will this year reach nearly 1,250,000,000 bushels, while the products of hay and corn will exceed 25,000,000 tons, as compared with over 1,000,000,000 bushels of grain and 20. 1,000,000,000 bushels of grain and 20.000,000 tons of hay and corn in 1919,
according to official figures compiled by
J. Bruce Walker, director of publicity
for the department of immigration and
colonization. It is estimated that the
price of 1920 wheat will average \$2 per
bushel, said Mr. Walker. The field
crops of Canada represent about \$170
per head of the population, as compared
with \$110 per head in the United
States.

WHEAT CORNER TO BOOST PRICE

Association Asks 70.000 United States Farmers To Stop Selling.

WANT THREE DOLLARS

October 25 Is Date Set For **Trading To Cease, Says** Bulletin.

WICHITA Kan., Oct. 9 .- The Wheat Growers' Association of the United States, with a membership of 70,000 in Kansas, Oklahoma, Texas, Nebraska in Kansas, Oklahoma, Texas, Nebraska and South Dakota, has issued from its office here a proclamation to all its members, urging them to refrain from selling any wheat after 8 p.m. October 25 until such time as the price of good wheat is raised to \$3.00 a bushel at growers' terminal.

Agricultural colleges, farm bureaus, state boards of agriculture and similar organizations are urged to co-operate organizations are urged to co-operate with the association in its effort to

with the association in its effort to raise the price of wheat.

The proclamation is signed by W. F. McMichael, national president, and W. H. McGreevy, national secretary. The latter said today that he expects the members of the organization to refrain from selling their wheat until the price of \$3 is re-established. ALMOST LYNCHED


